King Gustav II Adolf 1611-1632

The eldest son of Karl IX was sixteen years old upon his father's death in 1611. By the rules of succession he would not come of age until the age of 23. This proved to be negotiable. Gustav granted concessions to the council of nobles and became king.

He inherited ongoing wars with Denmark-Norway, Russia and with Poland, where his cousin Sigismund continued to maintain his claim to the Swedish throne. Peace was concluded with Denmark-Norway in 1612. Sweden ceded the Finmark region to Norway and the port of Alvsborg was held for ranson by Denmark. Russia was still weak and Sweden obtained Karelia and Ingria which provided a connection between Swedish possessions in Finland and Esthonia. (Peter the Great of Russia later seized this territory to build the city of Saint Petersburg).

The war with Poland continued until the temporary truce of Altmark in 1629. In the meantime the Bohemian War broke out in 1618. This eventually expanded throughout all of northern Europe as the Thirty Years' War between the Protestant and Catholic elements. Gustav regarded the Protestant cause and the interests of Sweden as identical and began intervention in Germany in 1628. Sweden was to be involved in this arena for the next twenty years.

In spite of his youth Gustav had military experience in the War against Denmark when he became king. He proved himself a very able general and took personal command in many of the battles during his reign.
