

In truth and unity

Charles X became king upon the abdication of Christina. He inherited the same situations that had controlled Swedish foreign policy for many years. The king
of Poland, John Casimir (Vasa) who had a better claim
by descent to the Swedish throne, maintained that claim.
Denmark, which included Norway and Southern Sweden,
was a constant threat.

Charles determined to resolve the Polish situation and, allied with Brandenburg, declared war on Poland in 1655. In 1656 the Swedes conquered Warsaw and controlled half of Poland, John Casimir was forced to flee to Silesia and Charles proclaimed himself king of Poland. The situation soon changed. Russia had its own designs on Poland and declared war on Sweden. Denmark and the Holy Roman Empire also declared war and Brandenburg switched sides. The Swedes were driven out of Poland in 1657 but Charles launched a successful invasion of Denmark from the south in 1657. This was followed in the winter of 1657-58 by a daring undertaking of crossing on the ice and decisively defeating the Danes. By the treaty of Roskilde in 1658 Sweden received the southern provinces of Skane. Blekinge. Halland, and Bohuslan, the island of Bornholm and the province of Trondheim in Norway.

This peace with Denmark did not last long. The Danes found an ally in Holland and violated some of the treaty conditions. Charles again invaded Denmark with the aim of complete conquest. Copenhagen was saved by a last ditch defence. Sweden was at war with Denmark, Russia, Poland, Holland and Brandenburg when Charles died suddenly in 1660. He was thirty eight years old and had been king for six years. His son who inherited the throne was only four years old.


