ULRIKA ELEANORA AND FREDERICK (1718-1751)

The death of Charles XII caused a crisis in Sweden. Charles had been too occupied with war to marry. He always said there would be time for that after war. He left no heir to the throne.

The Council of Nobles chose his sister, Ulrila Eleanora, as queen. However, they imposed considerable limitations on her power. Sweden had experienced difficulties of absolute monarchy with an absent being when decisions were delayed or impossible.


Sweden was still at war with several nations these disputes were eventually settled. Sweden lost most of her Baltic possessions but retained Finland.

There was no feeling against a female ruler = n Sweden. However, Ulrika still had some of the absolute ideas of her brother. In 1720 the crown was transferred to her consort husband, Frederick, with further limitations.

In the ensuing years political parties emerged in Sweden. These were the Hats and the Caps. The Hats were the militant party who wanted to restore the of Sweden by war with Russia to regain the lost Baltic territories. The more realistic party were called the Caps. They realized that Sweden had to accept the situ ation. The militant party described the other party as sleepy old men in night caps while they used the me military tricorn hat as their symbol.

The party leaders became the real power in Sweden while King Frederick was a virtual figurehead. The Cap were in control for many years with Arvid Horn as their leader. He was finally forced to retire in 1738 a _nd th Hats took over under Count Karl Gyllenborg. After many years of peace Sweden became involved in war with Russi in 1741 as an incident of the War of the Austrian Succession and because of a treaty with France. Swed_ en was unprepared and was defeated.
