The Swedish flag we display at Monitor Lodge has special significance. It was presented to members of our lodge by the King of Sweden. It has a silver plaque on the staff of the occasion. We have decided that we should take special care of this flag and, at our last meeting we voted to purchase a new Swedish flag to use at outdoor occasions and other events. We will ensure that we have an American flag of similar dimensions.

Our last meeting was ladies night in honor of Mother's day. Our men served an excellent roast beef dinner. However, behind every successful man there stands a supporting woman. Margaret Carlson did not trust Roland to get everything done at the right time and assumed some kitchen supervision. Also, we owe thanks to Marge Skicklig for the decorations. We men could not have done as well.

As the days grow longer spring comes quickly to Scandinavia. The temperatures now are in the 50s and 60s F. However, on May 6, when we had that cold storm passing through, all the highs and lows for Oslo, Copenhagen, Helsinki and Stockholm were higher than the Sacramento readings. The Scandinavians wait eagerly for spring for the outdoor activities. We have our first such activity with the sill frukost on May 31. This is followed by Sweden Day at Micke Grove on June 1. The highlight is Midsummer which we will celebrate on June 22 at Elk Grove Park. These are occasions to invite friends and prospective members.

Our next meeting will be preceded by a potluck. This is a change from the program book but a good occasion to make our last meeting before the summer recess more festive. We hope to make the business meeting short and show some slides of Scandinavia. We have some formal items and then will declare an open meeting. Again invite prospective members.

This monarch became ruler of Denmark by inheritance, of Norway by marriage, and of Sweden by election. The time was in the late 1300's and the monarch was a woman: Margaretha of Denmark.

Vilhelm Moberg, the Swedish author-historian, had little regard for monarchy and his histories are very critical of Swedish kings. But he had a special regard for Margaretha and it was he who described her as Scandinavia's greatest monarch. Moberg believed in closer union of the Scandinavian peoples and in peace. Margaretha's rule accomplished both of these. There was actual union and an end to the wars between these countries.

She was the daughter of Valdemar IV of Denmark. Born in 1353 she was given in marriage to Haakon IV of Norway at the age of ten. On her father's death in 1375 her infant son Olaf was elected King of Denmark. In 1380, on the death of Haakon he also succeeded as King of Norway. Olaf died in 1387. His mother had been regent for her son but then was declared "sovereign lady and ruler" of Denmark and Norway.

In 1388 the Swedish nobles who were in revolt against their foreign king, Albrecht of Mecklenburg, appealed to her for help and also declared her "sovereign lady and ruler" of Swden. They agreed to accept any king she would appoint.

Since her only son was dead, she chose her young great nephew, Eric of Pomerania, (1381-1459). Margaretha remained as regent in all three countries.

In 1397 there was a treaty conference of the three nations at Kalmar in Sweden. A plan of unity was drafted. This was never formally ratified but Sweden remained more or less united to the other countries until 1448. The union of Norway and Denmark lasted until 1814.
