

Not everything was happiness in the Gustavan Age. Russia continued to support opposition to Gustav's policy to strengthen Sweden and attempted to develop unrest in Finland. In 1788, while Russia was at war with Turkey, Gustav attacked Russia. The war was not popular with the army. A group of Finnish officers, known as the Anjala League, actually attempted to negotiate with Catherine II for freedom for Finland under Russian protection. Denmark took advantage to attack Sweden. Gustav turned these events to his favor, touring the country to gain support and was granted additional power. He was able to make peace with Russia in 1790 after a decisive naval victory and the status quo was resumed.

The outbreak of the French Revolution 1789 concerned all the crowned heads of Europe. Gustav was especially involved because of his close connections with the French court. Gustav sent Count Axel von Fersen to Paris as his representative. It was Fersen who attempted the unsuccessful rescue of Louis XVI and Marie Antoinette in 1791.

In Sweden the nobles had become embittered by their loss of power and privilege. They found themselves as ornaments of Gustav's court while, in the previous regime, they had been the real power. The officers in the Anjala Legue were all of noble families and Gustav had punished them harshly. By 1792 the hatred of the nobles had become so intense they conspired to a most desperate measure. Jacob Johan Anckarstrom, a former Captain of the Guard with a personal grudge against the king, was assigned to assassinate the king. At a midnight masked ball in the Opera House on March 16, 1792 he shot Gustav in the back. The wound was fatal but Gustav did not die until two weeks later. It is reported that Gustav had received an anonymous warning but refused to change his plans.


