Our November meeting is Friday November 6th. It's just a regular business meeting and will start 7:30 sharp.





THE NEW FRENCH PRINCE

Continued:

The Riksdag agreed to the selection of Bernadotte. The influence of Napdeon had great weight. Bernadotte's reputation as a military leader was also important. The loss of Finland to Russia still rankled and the Swedes hoped Bernadotte would lead them to recovery of the lost territory. He was accepted as crown prince on August 21, 1810.

Jean Bernadotte accepted the Lutheran faith on his arrival in Sweden on October 10, 1810. He was adopted as son by Charles XIII and took the Swedish name of Karl Johan (Charles John). He was now the future king. Sometimes the cycles of history make a complete revolution. It was in 1654 that Christina abdicated as queen of Sweden because she had renounced the Lutheran faith for Catholicism.

The crown prince immediately assumed control of the government. However, Napoleon exerted his influence and demanded that Sweden declare war on Great Britain. The Swedes had no choice and technically there was a state of war between 1810 and 1812 although there were no actual hostilities.

Napoleon's motives in supporting Bernadotte as the future king of Sweden are not entirely clear. Some historians claim he was flattered by the selection of one of his marshals. On the other hand, relations between Napoleon and Bernadotte had become strained and Napoleon may have regarded Bernadotte as a possible rival. By placing Bernadotte on the Swedish throne under obligation to him he removed him from France and gained a norther buffer against Russia. During most of Napoleon's reign France and Russia were at peace. Napoleon and Alexander had an arrangement similar to that of Hitler and Stalin to divide the control of Europe. Napoleon foresaw that this arrangement could not last indefinitely.

"NEW SWEDEN '88". It was in 1638 when two ships landed at the mouth of the Delaware River, near present-day Wilmington, Del. They were loaded with the first Swedish emigrants to colonize. One of the first colonics was in New Jersey. Log cabins are being built by Swedish craftsmen in the same locality of the first colony. Congress passed a Resolution, signed by President Reagan, to recognize this event and the_contributions Swedish people have made to U.S.A. "Whereas, in 1638, the Kingdom of Sweden sent 2 ships...to establish a colony in what is now the United States...be it Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America... That 1958 is designated the 'Year of New Sweden'. Signed by President Reagan on May 15, 1986. Sacramento has been designated a "Jubilee City", one of 59 cities in U.S. so designated. Your committee for "New Sweden *88" has been working toward the Celebration for 1988. You shall hear more from us! An event of high interest is the visit in April of King Carl XVI Gustaf and Queen Silvia to 13 U.S. cities. On the West Coast that is Los Angeles. Assisting Monitor Lodge in planning and helping are members from Nord Lodge and Sierra Kronan. Other lodges have offered to help with dissemination of news, advertisement, etc. Your Monitor Chairman on this Committee is Bee Dillard. Elizabeth Johnson acts as Secretary and Contact Person.


Nobody but nobody knows the work there is to a big undertaking of this kind, except the chairman, so do what you can. It is appreciated.....believe me!
