## The Two Lives of Axel Munthe

Axel Munthe (1857-1949) was a Swedish physician who had studied medicine in France and began his practice in Paris where he worked with the pioneer neurologist Charcot and with Pasteur. In 1929, his book "The Story of San Michele" was published. This was an account of his experiences as a doctor in Paris and later in Rome.

San Michele was the ruined villa on the Isle of Capri which Munthe loved and which he worked for years to own and rebuild.


"The Story of San Michele" became popular with everyone who read it. Even in the depression years it went through many printings. The book cannot be described as biography. It is more nearly a series of sketches. The book does reflect much of Munthe's personality and philosophy, his humanitarianism and love for animals.

When his son published a biography containing many of his father's notes after his father's death, there were many who believed him an imposter. They had an image of the gentle doctor who prefered the poor and humble to the rich and privileged, spurned honors, who had no family and had lived his deserved retirement at his beloved San Michele. They could not reconcile this image with the facts.

In fact, Munthe had been honored by both the governments of France and Italy. In 1908, he became court physician to the Swedish royal family. Many members of the royal family spent winters in Italy so he was not deprived of San Michele. He split with the royal family during World Way I because he believed them to be pro-German but later resumed the relationship. At his death in 1949, he had lived in the royal palace at Stockholm for ten years.

"The Story of San Michele" is still very readable. Reviewers say "its lasting success may be attributed to its intimate revelation of an unusually vital personality and its sympathetic, vivid description of suffering".


