The Three Times King

During the 1400's, Sweden was still a part of the Kalmar Union of Denmark, Norway, and Sweden. While this was accepted in Norway, which remained in the union until 1814, Sweden had a history of independence and elected kings. In 1441, Kristoffer of Bavaria was elected as the Union King of Sweden. He reigned only until his early death at age thirty-two in 1448.


Karl Knutsson Bonde had held important positions in Sweden for several years. As the Earl Marshal of Sweden, he had been the virtual ruler for several intervals. In 1448, he was elected King of Sweden as Karl VII. His first popularity did not last. His heavy taxes and harsh methods led to revolt in 1457, led by Jons Bengtsson, Bishop of Uppsala. Christian I of Denmark was elected King of Sweden and the Kalmar Union was restored. Karl went into exile in Danzig.

Conditions were no better. Christian was deposed and Karl acclaimed a second time as King in August 1464. This lasted only five months. Karl was deposed again but allowed to retain the title and given territories in Finland to govern. For the next couple of years there were competing regents. Karl was recalled from his exile in Finland in November 1467. He retained the throne until his death on May 15, 1470. Altogether, between 1448 and 1470, he had reigned only twelve years.

Karl Knutsson Bonde's principal popularity was that he was a kingly figure and of Swedish birth. Sweden had been ruled for many years by foreign kings. His extortionate taxes and harsh methods were typical of the time. When he suppressed the many revolts during his reign the leaders were burned at the stake.

Fifteen Swedish Accordianists will be visiting from Sweden. and will entertain during the evening.



She was getting a shot for an infection as she had run a high temperature the previous night. Ruth, hope you have a quick recovery.

Hope there were no others ill this last month.

Pepparkakor (Swedish ginger cookies)

A lady from Davis wrote into the mailbox of the Sacramento Bee and requested a recipe for "crisp Swedish gingersnaps". She had purchased some at our Scandinavian Festival. Karin Bodelson answered with her recipe which follows, with one correction in regard to corn syrup and molasses.

1 cup butter (2 sticks; half margarine OK)

1/2 cup granulated sugar

1/2 cup brown sugar

1/2 cup dark corn syrup and 1/2 cup molasses

1/2 teaspoon lemon flavoring

1 cup heavy cream, whipped stiff

About 6 cups all-purpose flour

1-1/2 teaspoons powdered cinnamon

1-1/2 teaspoons powdered cloves

2 teaspoons powdered ginger

1 tablespoon baking soda

Cream butter and sugars well. Stir the syrup in well. Add lemon flavoring. Blend in the whipped cream. Gradually add the flour, into which the baking soda and spices have been blended. After dough has been well mixed, place in covered bowl and refrigerate for a couple of hours or overnight.

Roll out very thin on floured board or pastry cloth. Cut in desired shapes with cookie cutters. Place on ungreased cookie sheets and bake at 350 degrees 10 to 15 minutes. Watch carefully because cookies burn if left too long. Cool on wire racks and pack in airtight containers. Freeze, if desired.

Makes about 400 small, very thin cookies.
