


attention from the pope. Sweden, consequently became involved in the Reformation and much of th church property and income was requisitioned by the government.

While Gustav's reign was troubled, his vigorous leadership made him the undisputed ruler and he is regarded as the founder of modern Sweden.

As members of the <u>Vasa Order of America</u>, we should be aware of the significance of the name o our order. It is a significant name.

At our membership seminar one of the subjects discussed was the problem of identity in the name of our order. Our sister lodges, Sons of Norway, Dania, and Finlandia, do not have that problem.

To the founders of the order as immigrants from Sweden, there was no such difficulty. The name of VASA was known and Gustav Vasa was as familiar to them as George Washington is to us. In fact, Gustav Vasa, is a comparable figure, the leader of a revolt against foreign oppression who later became the head of his nation.

Gustav Eriksson Vasa (1496?-1560) was a young nobleman in Sweden when Christian II of Denmark enforced his claim to Sweden as a part of the Union of Kalmar. Christian was King of Denmark and King of Norway in the Union and felt that Sweden should be his also. Sweden had been a part of the Union originally but had not accepted foreign domination. Christian invaded Sweden and conquered. One consequence, was the execution of many of the prominent resistance leaders in 1520.

Gustav Vasa had been sent to Denmark as one of the hostages to insure Christian's conquest. He escaped, returned to Sweden to learn of the massacre which had included his father and brotherin-law. He made his way to Dalarna. He spent some time as a fugitive from the Danes while he tried to raise a revolt by informing the people of the Stockholm massacre. He was not successful and began to make an escape to Norway when other confirmation of the massacre reached Dalarna. He was recalled, rallied the people into revolt and eventually expelled Christian and the Danes from Sweden. In June 1523, he was elected King of Sweden as Gustav I.

He had a long and eventful but troubled reign. High taxes were necessary to repay the cost of the successful revolt. There was resistance. Sweden was a Catholic country at the time but received
