#### LAPLAND

Almost everyone has heard of Lapland (in Sweden they spell it Lappland). It is usually described as the part of Northern Sweden where the Lapps live. However, the Lapps were there before boundaries were drawn and they live in Norway, Sweden, Finland and the USSR. Lapps are usually described for census purposes as the people who speak Lappish (Samiska in Swedish). This also is difficult to define since there are three dialects, eastern, northern and southern, and these are quite different. By this definition there are probably about 45,000 Lapps. This figure is admittedly inaccurate.

About half of these Lapps live in Norway, about one third in Sweden, and the rest in Finland and the USSR. We always think of reindeer in connection with Lapland. However, most of the Lapps in Norway inhabit the narrow coastal belt and are fishermen. Only about one third of the Lapps in Sweden are engaged in reindeer herding. This was an outgrowth of earlier reindeer hunting and appears to be relatively recent in the 2,000 year history of the race. Lapland has become a developed area of mining and industry and most of the Lapps are employed along with Swedes and Finns. Much of the area is trilingual, public notices at the City Hall in Kiruna are published in Swedish, Finnish, and Sami.

Lapland is the center of the iron mining industry. The rich ores of Kiruna and Malmberget are transported to Luleå on the Gulf of Bothnia or to Narvik in Norway for shipment to other areas. Lapland is mountainous. Besides scenery that means sources of water power which have been developed for electricity.

Lapland is scenic. The scenery attracts visitors from all of Europe. It is beloved by hikers and nature lovers. The scenery is preserved in several national parks.

In the 1700's Sweden knew that Lapland existed and was part of Sweden but hardly anything was known about the region. Linneus gained his first recognition by his visit to Lapland in 1732. He reported not only on botany but on the fauna of the area and the culture of the people.
