
DINNER INVITATION

In Truth and Unity, Kurt Pfannkuch There were some contradictions in this arrangement. Schleswig continued to have a mixed population of Danes and Germans and Holstein continued to be German and included in the loose confederation of nominally independent German States known as the Holy Roman Empire headed by Austria. In spite of these problems the arrangement lasted for over 300 years.

The Holy Roman Empire (neither holy, nor Roman, nor an empire) came to an end in 1806 during the Napoleonic wars. When the congress in Vienna redrew the map of Europe after the defeat of Napoleon, it created the German Confederation composed of thirty nine of the smaller German states. Holstein was included in this confederation but not Schleswig. Although the confederation was too weak and disorganized to established any real authority, it added another element to the situation. However, after the association of over 300 years the Danes had come to feel that Schleswig and Holstein had become parts of the Kingdom of Denmark. (to be continued)


Note - the history of Schleswig-Holstein and Denmark 1s complex and confusing. I invite comments and assistance of our Danish members who may have knowledge of the subject.



"The indispensable man"

The Charter of Ribe signed by Christian I of Denmark when he was elected ruler of Schleswig and Holstein in 1460 contained many provisions. Schleswig and Holstein were recognized as independent entities but "indissolubly united". Since they were independent the laws of Denmark would not apply. Nothing could be done in relationship to either duchy which did not affect the other. The only relationship with Denmark was through the ruler in his two capacities as King and as Duke.

This had advantages for the kings of Denmark. They could continue the almost continuous conflict with Sweden with out the worry of a second front in Holstein. They were also able to deal with the neighboring German states as the Duke of Schleswig-Holstein without directly involving Denmark.

SWEDEN DAY PICNIC

Monitor Lodge along with other lodges will celebrate Sweden Day (svenska flaggans dag) on June 2 at Sank Park in Oroville. This is a colorful affair and we urge you to attend.

I never heard about Sweden Day until I joined Vasa, then no one could tell me much about it except that it concerned the swedish flag. Therefore, I addressed my questions to my friend in Uppsala, Arne Flygare, Colonel (Retired) of the Royal Swedish Army. He answered: "You asked me about the swedish flag. We will give you some information here. The exact age of the swedish flag is not known, but the oldest recorded pictures to a blue cloth with a yellow cross dates from the 16th century. As decreed in a royal warrant of 1569, the yellow cross was always to be borne on Swedish battle standards and banners, as the swedish coat was blue divided quarterly by a cross of gold. Since 1916, June 6th has been celebrated as Swedish Flag Day. This finally also became Sweden's National Day in 1983. The reasons for the choice of date are twofold: The election of Gustav Vasa as Sweden's king on June 6th, 1523, laid the foundation of Sweden as a separate state, and on the same date in 1809, Sweden adopted a new constitution which included the establishment of civil rights and liberties. The colors and design of the flag are laid down in the Flag Act of 1982."


(Ironically, the date of June 6 marks the beginning of the Vasa dynasty, but also marks the effective end of that dynasty. Gustav IV was deposed in 1809 and his elderly childless uncle became king as Charles XIII on June 6, 1809 upon his acceptance of the new constitution which severely limited the royal power. Charles XIII was regarded only as an interim king while search was made for a new succession. This resulted in the Bernadotte dynasty.)

Lillian Hellman Pot Roast, as served on Ladies' night.

1 4-pound beef roast (we used boneless crossrib)

1 can of cream of mushroom soup

1/2 envelope dried onion soup mix

1 large onion chopped

3 cloves garlic chopped

2 cups red wine

2 cups water

1 bay leaf, crushed

1 teaspoon thyme 1 teaspoon basil



Preheat oven to 350 degrees

Place the beef in a pot with cover with rest of ingredients. Cover and bake 3 1/2 hours or so. Check occasionally, more liquid may be needed. The gravy is made as the roast cooks.
