In truth and unity Kurt Pfannkuch The Congress of Vienna affected Sweden also. The union of Sweden and Norway was confirmed. Norway had been united with Denmark since the union of Kalmar in 1397 but had been separated during the Napoleonic wars. The congress awarded Swedish Pomerania (the Swedish possession on the south shore of the Baltic) to Denmark as compensation. Prussia forced Denmark to trade this territory for the duchy of Lauenburg. Lauenburg was a small duchy bordering Holstein. This had no great effect except to add another reluctant German population and another political entity to the situation. The duchy was included as an independent entity in the German Confederation.

This was a time when monarchy was important and questions of royal succession were even more important. The Salic Law was still a consideration. Under this archaic principle royal succession could only be trough the male line. The Salic law had never been accepted in Denmark but it did apply to the duchies of Schleswig, Holstein and Lauenburg. When it became apparent in 1839 that the royal house of Denmark would not have a male succession, the duchies prepared to separate themselves from Denmark. King Christian VIII attempted to deal with the situation with a new constitution that incorporated the duchies into the kingdom of Denmark. This was signed on his death bed and the problems were inherited by Frederick VII in January 1848.

The duchies of Holstein-Schleswig broke out into open revolt. Prussia came to assist and marched troops into the area. However, the other European powers, Great Britain, France, Norway-Sweden, Russia and Austria threatened to intervene. On August 26, 1848 Prussia agreed to the convention of Malmö and withdrew from the situation.

This was only temporary. Hostilities resumed, lines were drawn. With so many nations involved we now have the Schleswig-Holstein question. (So this must be continued)




