#### WHY SWEDEN HAS A KING

When I made a presentation about Sweden to Erika Lewis' social studies class I was asked the question "Why does Sweden have a king?" That is really not an easy question to answer and my response was "why not? Sweden has always had a king." That was really a retort rather than an answer.

To answer the question we have to know something about the parliamentary form of democracy that exists in Sweden. It also exists in Great Britain and many other countries of the world. We must also realize that the leadership of any country involves two functions. These are that of the Chief of State and that of the Chief of Government. The function of the first is to maintain continuity of function and to represent the spirit of the nation. The chief of Government is the leader of the operations of the government, the making of laws, administration of programs, and financing of the government.

In England and in Sweden the reigning monarch is the Chief of State, at this time Elizabeth of England and Carl Gustaf of Sweden. Their duties are largely ceremonial. Neither has any say on the operations of the government but they make State visits to other countries, receive delegations, grace important ceremonies by their presence and serve as honorary heads of charities etc.

The Chief of the Government is the Prime Minister who is the leader of the majority in the elected parliament. The members of his cabinet direct the various functions of government.

The government established in the United State of Independence was radically new at the time. The President is both the Chief of State on the Chief of Government. We can not say that it does not work. It has worked for 200 years but there are advantages to the European system. Much of the time of the President is taken up by ceremonies unrelated to operations of government which are his primary responsibility.

This is an attempt to surface a rather complex subject. Because Sweden has a king does not mean it is not a democracy. The best answer to the question "Why Sweden has a king?" is probably "why not? It has always had one".
