THE MAN OF MANY LIVES (CONT.)

In 1896 he became a professor of zoology at Christiana University but in 1908 his status was changed to professor of oceanography as his contribution that new science was recognized. He also participated in the International Council for Exploration of the Sea. He made several oceanographic voyages into the arctic.

In 1905 Nansen took part in the discussions leading to the dissolution of the union of Norway and Sweden and in 1906, he became the first minister in London of the new Norwegian monarchy. His interest in diplomacy continued and he headed the Norwegian delegation to the league of Nations in 1920 and continued as a representative until his death in 1930. In the League of Nations he directed repatriation of German and Austro-Hungarian prisoners of war. In 1921 he directed the relief activities of the International and Cross. In 1922 he initiated an international agreement for an identification paper for persons who had lost a homeland as a result of World War I. This became known as the "Nansen Passport". He received the Nobel peace prize in 1922 for these activities.

He wrote many books of his explorations and research. Many were illustrated with his own drawings and show high artistic merit.

A man of many lives? Yes, you will agree.

THE SWEDISH FLAG



The exact age of the Swedish flag is not known, but the oldest recorded picture to a blue cloth with a yellow cross date from the 16th century. As decreed in a royal warrant of 1569, the vellow cross was always to be borne on Swedish battle standards and banners, as the Swedish Coat of Arms was blue divided quarterly by a cross of gold. The design of the Swedish flag is probably taken from the Danish flag and its blue and yellow colors possibly come from the Coat of Arms. Not until the 1620s - i.e. during the reign of Gustav II Adolf - do we find any reliable evidence of the blue flag with a vellow cross being worn by Swedish vessels. According to our oldest existing flag warrant, from 1663, a triple-tailed flag was to be used except by merchant ships, whose flag was square-cut. Nowadays the use of the triple-tailed pennon is reserved for the Royal Family and the armed forces. The Royal Family may also charge their flags either with the Lesser or the Greater Coat of Arms in the center of the cross.

Since 1916, June 6 has been celebrated as the Swedish Flag Day. This finally also became Sweden's National Day in 1983. The reasons for the choice of date are twofold: the election of Gustav Vasa as Sweden's king on June 6, 1523 laid the foundation of Sweden as a separate state; and on the same date in 1809, Sweden adopted a new constitution which included the establishment of the civil rights and liberties.

The colors and design of the flag are laid down in the Flag Act of 1982.

The flag is normally hoisted at 8:00 am from March 1 to October 1, otherwise at 9:00 am. It is lowered at sunset, but no later than 9:00 pm. There are about 15 official flag days, including the special celebrations of the Royal Family, May Day, Election Day, United Nations Day (October 24) and Nobel Day (December 10). The flag may also be flown on special local or private family occasions.

The Swedish composer, Hugo Alfvén, captured this mood in his composition "Midsommarvaka". The music describes the gathering for a dance, the tuning of instruments, then the music begins the dance but a young couple steal away and the music fades in the distance, replaced by the sounds of nature. With the growing light they return to the dance which is still in swing and join in the final and most vigorous dances.

We will celebrate Midsommar at Elk Grove Park on June 22 but not in the lusty manner of old Sweden. We will garland and erect the Majstång, hopefully there will be music and dancing. The feasting is up to you, it is a family picnic. This is an informal occasion and a good time to welcome friends, especially of Swedish background to join in this traditional event. We will begin about 10 am, we need help to decorate the majstång and erect it with appropriate ceremony. Please come and help maintain this Swedish tradition. We will need greenery and flowers for the majstång, bring what you can.

For all you new members who haven't been to our "Kräftkalas" before, this is one event you can't afford to miss. Keep this date open for good food, a lot of fun and good fellowship. It will be Saturday evening August 17th at Bea Dillard's, 3940 Silver Spur Way. Bar opens at 6:00 pm and we'll eat at 6:30 pm. Bring a large salad, sandwiches, vegetables, fruit or whatever. This time bring your own card table and chairs. Plates and utensils will be furnished. Come and learn the real swedish way to eat crayfish with akvavit and all. Since there will be no August issue of the "Monitor" to remind you, it is important that you put this event on your calendar right now.



The Swedish celebration of Midsommar probably originated in the pagan celebration of the summer solstice, the longest day of the year. Midsommar is probably not the most accurate name; our calendars describe that as the first day of summer which almost always occur on June 21. The days gradually become longer until that date and then begin to shorten again. In Sweden's northern location that change is more noticeable than it is to us. To more primitive people who were closer to nature, this midpoint of the solar year had special significance. Since they had to contrive their own entertainment this was the occasion of music, dancing and feasting.

As Sweden became Christianized the church transformed this occasion into one of the church saint's days. John the Baptist day of June 24 was conveniently close and the occasion was shifted to that date. Originally the celebration was one of fertility rites. To some extent this still continued. Even with the new date the Midsommar night was one of the shortest of the year and the one occasion when young people were unchaperoned and couples could escape to enjoy themselves. The night was short, it was not a time for sleeping.
