Shape into balls. Make large meatballs to be served for dinner or small meatballs for the smörgåsbord.

Heat some of the margarine or butter in a skillet. When the foam subsides, add 10 to 15 meatballs. Cook over moderate heat until the meatballs are beautifully brown and cooked through. Transfer to a serving dish and keep hot while cooking the remaining meatballs. Serve with boiled potatoes, lingonberry preserve and a tossed salad.

## MESSAGE FROM THE CULTURAL LEADER

First, I would like to express my sincere thanks to the members who helped at our lodge's Cultural Booth and Exhibit at the Yuba City Prune Festival. Kurt and I were in our Swedish costumes and Karin and David Dorey helped to set up the booth. Myrtle Widmark, Karin Bodelson, Arlie Veis and Margaret Carlson were very helpful by being there Saturday to man the booth. Thank you for being such great supporters! Nearly 30,000 people attended the two day festival, and the international area was well visited. Many people signed up for more information about our Swedish lodge, cultural events, and, of course, our upcoming Smörgåsbord.

On the subject of Swedish food, I think this will make an interesting topic for the cultural program at the October meeting. The dinner that evening is traditional Swedish meatballs, and I am sure that there are more versions and variations of that dish than any other Swedish food. I am enclosing a recipe from the cook book "Swedish Cooking" published by ICA which includes recipes from the ICA Test Kitchen in Sweden. With our upcoming Smörgåsbord Dinner in November this program should provide a good opportunity to find out about the traditions and

background of Swedish foods. In particular, the foods traditionally served at a Smörgåsbord. The cultural program will be a "Show and Tell" event, so please feel free to bring anything that has to do with Swedish cooking. It could be recipes or tools, dishes etc., used in preparing and serving food. Please call me at 674-1068 and let me know about your participation in the program.

At the September meeting we discussed the Swedish Government and the upcoming Parliamentary Election. Thank you Lennart Thörnros and Kurt Pfannkuch for telling us about the seven different parties competing for seats in Sweden's September election.

Sweden is a constitutional monarchy with a parliamentary form of government. The King, since 1973 Carl XVI Gustaf, has only ceremonial functions as Head of State. The parliament consists of one chamber, whose members are directly elected by proportional representation for three year terms. Sweden has had universal suffrage since 1921 and the voting age is 18.

The Social Democratic Party held power alone or in coalitions from 1932 until the 1976 election when the non-socialist parties - Center, Liberal and Moderate (conservative) - won a majority and formed a coalition cabinet. After six years of non-socialist rule the Social Democrats returned to power again in 1982. They remained in office after the

1988 election, when they gained 156 of the 349 parliamentary seats. The remainder was shared between Moderates, the Liberals, the Center, the Communists, and the Green Party (the first new parliamentary party in nearly 70 years).

With the birth this year of New Democracy, a maverick, right wing, populist party, Sweden gained its seventh political party. After the election earlier in September, the results were rather interesting. Sweden's long-governing Social Democrats suffered their worst election defeat in more than 60 years. Financial problems, a stagnant economy, and high taxes prompted Swedish voters to swing sharply to the right. This gave the five non-Socialist parties a total of about 53% of the vote.

Many thanks to all of you who supported the Convention fund raising by purchasing calendars and books at the last meeting. We still have some left and they will be for sale again at the October meeting. When Kurt and I were in Sweden this summer, we brought back these wonderful items for the lodge and the artist is Erkers Marie Persson from Leksand, Dalarna. She has been called a modern Carl Larsson because of her style of painting. I urge you to come to our meeting and see Marie's artwork. The calendars portray a different Swedish province for each month, with recipes in English from that province. The

books, about Swedish summer and Christmas, are written and illustrated by Marie. The calendars, and the books, will make great Christmas gifts. The desk-top calendar is \$7.00 and a larger version sells for \$12.50. The books are \$15.00 each. Postcards in two sizes are also available. The smaller postcards are 50¢ each. Large postcards, suitable for framing, are \$1.00 each or \$15.00 for a set of twenty-five cards. If you cannot attend the meeting, contact myself or Myrtle Widmark to obtain these items. Remember, we are selling these to raise money for our lodge's 80th Anniversary Dinner and the District Convention in April. I'll look forward to seeing all of you at the next meeting.




