

# THE MODERN VIKING EXPLORER

It was at the turn of the century when a young Canadian of Icelandic parentage entered the University of Iowa. He gave his name as William Stephenson. However, a few years later when he completed his studies, he had reclaimed his Icelandic heritage and revised his name to the Icelandic form as Vilhjalmur Stefansson. It is by that name he is known for his arctic exploration.



His first expeditions were to his ancestral homeland of Iceland for archeological investigation of early settlements. In 1906 he made his first expedition to the Canadian Arctic. He was to join a party arriving by ship while he travelled overland. The ship was unable to penetrate the ice so Stefansson spent a year living with the Eskimos, learning the language and culture and Eskimo life. He learned to live off the land and employed this knowledge in subsequent exploration from 1908 to 1912.



From 1913 to 1918 he led expeditions for the Canadian government into previously unexplored areas of the Canadian Arctic.

One of Stefansson's special interests was to change the concept of the arctic as inhospitable. One of his books is entitled "The Friendly Arctic." He often said that he had been more uncomfortable in North Dakota then in the arctic.

In 1932 he became an adviser to Pan American Airways on arctic operations. During World War II he was an adviser to the United States on arctic defense. From 1947 until his death in 1962 he was a consultant to the Northern studies program at Dartmouth College.

Stefansson did not shrink from controversy and many of his favorite proposals were controversial. He advocated that the United States or Canada should claim Wrangel Island, north of Eastern Siberia. Wrangel Island while in Asia, had been visited and explored by U.S. whalers and naval units long before any Russian exploration or occupation. While there were advantages to weather stations on Wrangel at that time, these have been outmoded by new technologies and weather satellites. It is only in very recent years that the U.S. has acknowledged Russian sovereignty over Wrangel.

Stefansson had lived with the Eskimos and shared their life and diet. He challenged the nutritional thinking that a high protein diet was not conducive to health and submitted himself as the human guinea pig for experiments. He spent months enjoying himself devouring steaks and high fat meats while being studied. He often declared that he felt his best on a B and B diet (beef and bourbon).

Note: The Vasa Order is open to

all of Nordic heritage including the Icelandic. We have at least

one member of that heritage.
