### RECIPE BOOKLET

Some recipes have been turned in but more are needed. We want the recipes for all the foods served at the Smörgåsbord and any additional recipes that you use.





The Faroe islands are located in the North Atlantic roughly halfway between Scotland and Iceland. The area is 540 square miles and the population is about 50,000. While they are isolated they appear to have been populated since before 800, at first by Irish hermits and then by Viking settlers from Norway. The present inhabitants are descended from these Norsemen. Their language is still Old Norse. King Olaf Tryggvessön of Norway introduced Christianity about 1000. The islands became a Norwegian fief in 1035. When Norway became associated with Denmark in 1380 under Queen Margareta this interest was transferred to Denmark. When Norway was separated from Denmark in 1814 the Danish king retained the Faroes.



Great Britain took control of the islands during the German

occupation of Denmark 1940-1945. This prevented German use of the islands as a naval base. The British developed a system of roads on the islands.

The principal industry of the islands is fishing. Because of the latitude and exposure there are no trees but extensive meadows. Sheep have been raised on the islands from earliest times, the name "Faroe" may be derived from the name for sheep in old Norse.



The Faroes received their limited independence in 1947. They have complete control over local matters such as schools and taxation but remain within the kingdom of Denmark for foreign affairs. Self-government is exercised through the "lagting," a council which goes back to Viking times.

illustrations. In other words, picture composition was often borrowed - a framework on which to build. But thereafter, the painter seemed to give his imagination free rein and unleashed his whole creative joy.



He filled his paintings with people wearing the costumes of his native parish. He painted houses, plants and multitudes of decorative motifs. In Dalarna, nobody knew what Jerusalem looked like, but people had been to the county seat, Falun, and were convinced that the houses in Dalarna towns were as fine as those in Jerusalem. The Dal painters also copied from illustrated prayer books and fashion magazines.

Although Biblical motifs dominate Dal paintings, artists also depicted everyday episodes, royalty and other historical characters.

"Here be both Roses and Flowers which grow both in Winter and Summer." This text is

to be found above a painting, dated 1797 by Winter Carl Hansson, from Leksand. Hansson was one of the leading Dal painters. In Dal painting these "Roses and Flowers" are known as "KURBITS," a word which actually means "gourd." "Kurbits" and "kurbits painting" refer to the floral decorations applied to painted furniture, stylized and developed up to the 1790's until they came to be incorporated into the motifs depicted on the wall hangings in the cabins. The name kurbits is taken from the Old Testament Book of Jonah. The plant or gourd is a symbol both of vitality and of death (Jonah, Chapter 4).

Each Dal painter had his own way of expressing kurbits and always allowed room for this decorative motif to grow in the painting. Kurbits has come to be the distinguishing characteristic of Dal painting.

Harry Johnson is doing well after his knee replacement surgery on January 11th and will be home soon.



# FOLK PAINTINGS FROM DALARNA (cont.)

Through the church, the people of Dalarna could expand their physical world with the world of the Bible. It was from the world of the Bible that the Dal painters took most of their motifs. The majority of the population was at this time illiterate, but to enable them to "read" their Bibles, various editions of "Picture Bibles," sort of "Biblia Pauperum" were issued during the 18th century. These contained illustrations of salient episodes and accorded only secondary importance to the text.

The illustrations, which were also in part included in the Swedish Bible translation of 1618, came originally from North Germany and were made about 1580.

The research of the past fifty years into Dal Painting has shown that the Dal Painters were bound by the illustrations of the "Picture Bibles." Figures, buildings and objects were placed in the same position as in the Bible
