

# ■ The Third King ■

The American historian Fletcher Pratt had a special interest in Valdemar IV of Denmark. He wrote a history of Valdemar's reign which he titled "The Third King."



This Valdemar was the third strong king of Denmark with that name. The first was Valdemar I (1157-1182) who was called the strong. The second was

Valdemar II (1202-1241) who was called the conqueror. The strong kings were followed by a number of weak kings who were dominated by greedy nobles and rapacious neighbors. They could not hold Denmark together and Denmark became divided into small units, many controlled by Holstein and German nobles.

When Valdemar IV was elected king in 1340, his only clear possession was northern Jutland. He was probably only 20 at the time. He had been brought up at the court of the German Emperor Louis of Bavaria and had backing from the Emperor who furnished money and a small number of German mercenary soldiers. For nine years, Count Gerhard of Holstein had dominated most of Denmark, but he had been assassinated earlier in 1340. Copenhagen was in the possession of King Magnus of

Sweden who also held Skåne which had been Danish. By diplomacy and judicious use of German gold and German mercenaries, Valdemar was able to recover Copenhagen and gradually to reacquire most of Denmark.

This progress was slow, but by 1360 he was able to invade and conquer Magnus and reacquire Skåne. Skåne was not only a fertile breadbasket but controlled the herring fishery in the Baltic. Herring was a staple food for all of Catholic Europe and the taxes and tolls from this fishery provided Valdemar with substantial revenue.

Valdemar's constant opponent was the Hanseatic League. This was an associa-



tion of German merchants with mercenary armies. The league controlled most of the trade in the Baltic. Their headquarters were in Visby on the island of Gotland. In July 1361, Valdemar led a fleet to invade Gotland and he conquered Visby. This lead to war with Sweden, which was aided by the Hanseatic League. Valdemar was again successful. (To be continued)

#### VÄRMLAND TORTE

(Värmlandstårta) Serves 8-10

Meringue layers: 5 egg whites 3/4 cup (1 3/4 dl) sugar 1 1/3 cups (3 1/2 dl) ground hazelnuts (or almonds) 3 rounded tablespoons cocoa

Preheat oven to 300°F (150C). Butter well two removable-bottom 8inch (20 cm) cake pans and dust with flour. Beat egg whites until stiff. Carefully fold in sugar and ground hazelnuts. Sift in cocoa. Spread mixture in buttered pans. Bake for about 35 minutes. Remove sides and loosen from bottom of pan while still somewhat warm. Let cool.

Buttercream frosting: 5 egg yolks 2/3 cup (1 1/2 dl) sugar 1/2 cup (1 1/4 dl) light cream 5 1/2 ounces (150 gr) butter blanched almond flakes

Heat egg yolks, sugar and cream in an enameled or stainless steel pan. Stirring constantly, cook over low heat until thickened. Do not boil. Remove from heat and stir until lukewarm. Add butter, mixing well. Refrigerate until frosting reaches a stiff spreadable consistency. Spread half of frosting between the two meringue layers and the rest on top and sides. Sprinkle with oven-toasted almond flakes.

This torte is very suitable for freezing.

During the cold Swedish winter, hot satisfying food is particularly enjoyed. The most Swedish of soups — pea soup — is included on many menus every Thursday throughout the winter. Pea soup is made from dried yellow peas, which are boiled for a long time together with lightly salted pork. Thyme and marjoram give the soup a special flavor. Although pea soup is really a meal in itself, it is traditional to follow it with thin pancakes and jam or the small pancakes called *plättar*.

Other Swedish specialties popular during the winter are stewed brown beans with fried pork, and lightly salted meat which is boiled and served with mashed potatoes or mashed turnips. The most common fish dish is fried strömming (Baltic herring) which can be had all the year around. Any fried strömming left over can be marinated in vinegar and served cold the next day. Plain boiled potatoes (usually boiled in the skin) are, by tradition, served with Swedish everyday fare. In the olden days, potatoes, cabbage, and carrots were practically the only vegetables available in the winter and the main source of vitamin C.
