

# GETTING TO KNOW OUR LODGE MEMBERS



Ingrid Kennedy was born Ingegerd Sjölander and grew up with three brothers in Bromma, a suburb of Stockholm. Her interests were sports: track and field in the summer, skiing and skating in the winter, and horseback

riding. She also enjoyed reading, knitting, and playing the piano. Ingrid came to the United States for the first time in 1953 as a temporary "adventure" only, working in Washington, D.C. for five years. However, after she had returned to Sweden, Ingrid met her American husband-to-be when both worked at the American Embassy in Stockholm. So it was back to the United States again, this time permanently. Ingrid was a late bloomer: She married and had her two children while in her mid and late 30s. And she started college in her 40s, getting her bachelor of arts degree the same year she turned 50. Through her husband's work assignments, the family lived in Turkey for two years and in Germany for four years. These assignments provided excellent travel opportunities, including many trips to Sweden to visit family and friends. Ingrid is now a widow and working at Mather Air Force Base (until it closes, that is). Her daughter lives in the Los Angeles area and her son in the Seattle area. Lately, she seems to be into doing newsletters: Besides the Monitor newsletter, she does one at work, one for a ski club, and one for her homeowners association.

### THE PROTESTANT POPE

When Nathan Söderblom died in July 1931, his obituary in *Time Magazine* stated: "If Protestantism had a pope, it would have been Nathan Söderblom." At the time of his death, Nathan Söderblom was Archbishop of Uppsala and the head of the State Lutheran Church of Sweden. He had held that position since 1914.

Söderblom was born in 1866. His father was a Lutheran minister and Söderblom early demonstrated his interest in serving the church. He attended Uppsala University and received degrees in classical and oriental languages as well as theology. He was ordained in 1893. His first pastorate was as chaplain to the Swedish-Norwegian legation in Paris. (Sweden and Norway were joined at that time.)

Paris was a mecca for students from all over Europe and America. There were many art students and students of music, medicine, and science. They were sure that a year or two of study in France was the key to fame and fortune. Söderblom and his young bride ministered to this odd congregation.

Every Monday evening was open house at the pastor's residence. There were 30 to 40 students in attendance. Most were Scandinavian but there were also others, including the young medical student Albert Schweitzer. On Thursdays, Söderblom held confirmation classes for the children. Always he sought benefits of employment or sponsorship for the students of his congregation.



After seven years of this assignment, Söderblom was recalled to Uppsala where he was appointed professor of theology. He continued the close relationship with students and had an invigorating effect on the university and church life.

Söderblom's fame spread. In 1912, he was also appointed professor at Leipzig, Germany. This ended with World War I in 1914. That was the year he was appointed Archbishop of Uppsala. (Cont'd on the next page)

His first proclamation to the ministers and congregations quoted the Apostle Paul: "You are not masters but fellow servants." This theme attracted attention in the Lutheran churches of Germany and in the reformed churches of France. Söderblom believed that Christian unity should be the first step to real world peace. World War I limited Söderblom's spreading this concept. After the war he was able to visit England, America, and most of the countries of Europe and organize a series of conferences on Christian life and



work. These conferences led to the formation of the World Council of Churches and it was for this work that Söderblom was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 1930.

Söderblom possessed great administrative ability and was an effective organizer. He also possessed a common touch and was equally at ease with statesmen, royalty, and young students. I believe *Time Magazine* was right.
