

MEMBER OF THE MONTH

Our latest member of the month is Ed Nelson and here is his story:

On a beautiful day in Wisconsin, two young people were picking berries: Ida Swenson from Värnamo and Edgar Nelson from Lindköping, Sweden. When they glanced up, their eyes met and it was love at first sight! They married and had three little *pojkar*, Lloyd, Edmund, and Leonard. By this time, they had settled in Joliet, Illinois. My father became ill and died when I was six years old. And when he was only 16, my brother Lloyd died.

Later, my mother became ill and Leonard and I were placed in a Swedish Lutheran orphanage while she was hospitalized. Years passed and I became a mechanic at McClellan Field here in Sacramento during World War II.

But back in Joilet, I had met my wife Billye. When she moved to Sacramento in 1943, I followed her and brought my mother. Billye and I were married in May 1944 in Reno. We have now been married 49 years and have two daughters, Carol Sams of Seattle, a musician married to Jerry, and Marie Green who is a speech pathologist, lives in Auburn, and is married to Raymond. Carol's children are Edmund Asa and Peter Raymond. Marie's children are Ryan Kelly and Erin Joy.

I attend the Arden Christian Church, and, besides Monitor Lodge, I am a member of SIRs #9, and the Bakers' Local #85. I love to play golf, bowl, travel, and be with friends and family. I retired from Wonder Bakery in 1982. In April, my brother passed away, leaving me the only survivor of Ida and Edgar.

I took a trip to Värnamo and met 12 cousins of my mother's family. The visit was a lesson in Swedish hospitality I will never forget. Several of my cousins have visited us here and we have become close.

Billye and I can be found at the home where we have lived since 1956.


SWEDEN DAY

FROM OUR CULTURAL LEADER

Congratulations to all the fellows who arranged a great Mother's Day dinner and entertainment! Rumors tell me it was quite a treat and I was sorry to miss it. I was in Palo Alto preparing for the "Sweden in Bloom" festival. It was a great success and I hope it will be repeated next year in the same beautiful park. The music and dancing were great and the kaffestuga och korvkiosk had plenty of visitors. Unfortunately, they ran out of the wonderful almond pastry tarts (mazariner) before I had a chance to have one! All kinds of interesting Swedish things were sold by various vendors. One of the most beautiful displays for sale

was a collection of amber jewel-ry. Did you know that amber is fossilized tree resin 40-60 million years old and that amber was gathered on the shores of the North and Baltic Seas and traded with Greece and Rome centuries before Christ? Amber is still regarded as a rare and wondrous substance.

Hearing stories from our Monitor members about how their ancestors came here, often before or around the turn of the century, I thought I'd share some facts about the first immigrants from Sweden. Did you know...

• that the first Swedes to set foot in America arrived on Calmare Nyckel and Fogel Grip 18 years after the legendary Mayflower landed in 1620 and, therefore, that Sweden was one of the five countries to establish colonies in North America?

- that after 17 years (in 1655), Sweden lost the New Sweden colony to Holland, which in turn lost it to England in 1664?
- that more than four million Americans have Swedish ancestry?
- that 1½ million Swedes emigrated to the United States between 1840 and 1930?

America needed people to settle its vast frontier territories and to provide labor for developing industries. In Sweden, the land had become overpopulated, so the best work a young man might find would be as a hired hand on someone else's farm without hope of advancement. Crops failed in Sweden for many years, and the country was described as "one great poorhouse." So, off to America! During the 1880s, a decade of agricultural crisis in Sweden, over 300,000

people left. By 1910, one out of every five Swedes lived in America. Although most of those who left Sweden were farmers, a majority of the Swedish immigrants settled in the cities, many of them like Ed Nelson's father in the lumber industry. It was said around 1930, that Swedish contractors had built a third of Chicago. In our time, California has attracted a growing number of Swedish immigrants. Some of you are members of Monitor Lodge because your forefathers left Sweden in the 1800s and some of us are emigrants of this century. However, we all share an interest in keeping our heritage alive.

In closing, this immigrant is flying to Sweden in a few hours. I'll see you at the June meeting with lots of news from "home"!!!


