

I am a California Swede, born right here in Sacramento. My parents both came from Arvika in the Province of Värmland. They knew each other in Sweden but didn't get married until coming to America. My father came over in the early 1900s and settled in the Sacramento area where he had relatives. My mother followed a few years later. Father was a farmer. He eventually bought his own little place in Elk Grove, where I grew up and went to school.

After graduating from Elk Grove High School, I started working for the State as a clerktypist and stayed for 41 years! I worked in several departments and retired from the State Architect's Office in 1987 when I was offered the "Golden Handshake." I still work for the State part time as a "retired annuitant."

I enjoy travelling, gardening, baking, and attending *Nål och Tråd*. I have been a member of Monitor Lodge for almost 20 years and enjoy the many activities and friendships.

I finally had a chance to travel to the Scandinavian countries in 1989 and it was great to visit the land of my ancestors. I especially enjoyed Värmland, seeing where my parents grew up and the places I had heard so much about. I hope I can go back some day and see some of the things I missed the first time.

## Camellia Festival March 5-6

The Camellia parade will be held on Saturday, March 5, and the Children's Club has been asked to participate. The lodge has the cart that can be decorated and used for this occasion. Members who have worked on this project before would be a big help to our newcomers. There will be more information later about the exhibits and entertainment.

Monitor Lodge is looking for eligible male or female students, including children or grand-children of members, to represent our lodge at the Camellia Festival. A student can represent our lodge there even if he or she does not meet the criteria for student ambassador. The youngster selected as student ambassador will receive a \$1,000 scholarship and will represent the Sacramento Camellia Festival in our sister city Matsuyama in Japan. The scholarship can be used for a college or accredited vocational training institute of the student's choice

The International Friendship Committee (IFC) has the following suggested criteria for the selection as Student Ambassador:

- High school senior, or
   Freshman or Sophomore in college, with a grade point average of 3.0 or above.
- Sponsored by IFC member ethnic group.
  - Resident of Sacramento.
- Able to well represent his or her country.
- Must wear appropriate ethnic costume for designated activities (parade, luncheons, exhibits, etc.)

The IFC suggests that countries select a representative before 31 December. Interviews will be held in January and the selection of a student ambassador will be made by Sacramento Camellia Festival representatives by March 1.

## Cultural Corner

As you read this, you have probably just finished the turkey leftovers from Thanksgiving and you are starting to think about Christmas. For me, as a Swede living in America, Thanksgiving was a new and wonderful holiday. It gave me the chance to be very thankful for this wonderful country that has provided me with opportunity for family, friendships, growth, and prosperity. I always felt Thanksgiving was a great prelude to the Christmas season. It gives us a taste of upcoming celebrations and eases us into the four weeks of Advent. It is always wonderful to know, as the turkey and stuffing are gone, that it is time to bring out the advent candle holder and the advent star.

Let me share some of the traditions I have brought with me from my home in Sweden to our home here in America. When I grew up, we always had a small advent tree with four candles which were lit one by one, one Sunday at a time, during Advent. We lived by the forest so it was easy for my father to go out and cut a small tree. However, we have kept up this tradition here in America with my American family, even though it means going to the Christmas tree lots to find a small tree. Why the advent tree, you might ask! Most of the customs associated with Christmas are old except for the customs of Advent. The first time we hear about the four advent candles in Sweden is from the home of Arch Bishop Nathan Söderblom at the turn of the century. The candles were placed on a juniper

bush in the house. Much later, the industrial manufacturing of advent candle holders got started. However, the little advent tree still remained in Sweden through the 40s and 50s, and the custom was brought to America by at least one Swede!

In our home here in California we also have an advent star which is lit and hung in the window for everyone to see on the first Sunday of Advent. The star was brought here from Sweden, but it is actually a custom of German origin. The idea to hang a lit star in the window during Advent got started in Herrnhut, Germany, around the year 1880. The star was originally made of paper. A few such stars made their way to Sweden, but they didn't become common until the mid 30s. Eventually, you would find the star in almost every home. Stars were also made of other materials, such as thin wood, glass, and straw.

Another custom Sweden got from Germany was the advent calendar. It was introduced in Sweden in 1934 by the Swedish Girl Scouts. Aina Stenberg Mas-Olle drew the first one and she did one every year until 1964. Now there are many different such calendars available, but the ones most commonly seen here in America are still the German calendars. It is an exciting tradition for kids (and maybe those of us who are still kids at heart) to open one door every day of December, finishing up by opening the last and biggest one on December 24.

I hope you all have some traditions to celebrate Advent. It is a very busy time for most of us, but it is also a wonderful time to stop for a moment, light a candle, and reflect over the true meaning of Christmas.

I know I will see all of you at our Glögg Party and at that time I will share some more of the Christmas traditions that are special to me and my family.
