

In Memoriam

Gustav Mattson was born in Sweden in 1905 and had five brothers. He came to this country in 1923 and stayed with an aunt and uncle in St. Paul, Minnesota. When they moved to the warmer climate of Sacramento, Gus went with them. He worked for Southern Pacific, in a logging camp, on a Swedish fishing boat in San Francisco, in Berkeley and Oakland doing odd jobs, and as a machinist and carpenter for contractors all over

Sacramento. Times were hard.

Gus played the mandolin, guitar and violin. He played in the Swedish church when he first came to America and sang in his church's choir for many years.

Gus married in 1946. Widowed, he later remarried and had a son, two granddaughters, and four great grandchildren. He moved to the El Camino Gardens here in Sacramento in 1990. Residents there say he enjoyed talking about Monitor Lodge, especially the annual Smörgåsbord. He also liked to tell them about old Swedish customs, such as the four advent candles on a juniper bush and the advent star in the windows in Sweden.

Gus was a dear friend and very active in our lodge. For instance, he was one of the Monitor Singers many years ago. He still had two sisters-in-law, a nephew, and a cousin in Sweden. Many Monitor members attended the beautiful funeral services. We all miss our friend and lodge brother, Gus Mattson.

Member of the Month



This month, we have the pleasure of getting to know Birgitta Ellis a little better. This is her story:

Sweden, where the lakes are cool and clear,

the rivers flow swiftly from the mountains, the snow covers the earth with its stillness during the winter sleep, and tiny Vitsippor emerge to tell again about the never-ending cycle of life. The land of the midnight sun. This is where I, Birgitta Wetterfors-Ellis was born on January 25, 1931, in Stockholm, the capitol. It is a lovely city, also called the city between the bridges. Art, music, and languages took much of our time, an influence I have always treasured. During the summers, we moved to the country in different parts of Sweden. Bicycle trips with my parents and my sister were fun with picnics along the roadside or in the meadow where deer were grazing. It was one way of seeing one's country. My older brother often visited. I was fortunate to have loving parents who put the family first, including a good education and building an enduring faith. I am the only one in the family to emigrate to the United States.

During World War II, we got used to rationing of food, especially meat, coffee, bread, and butter. Many times we had to cover the windows with black paper, as the Germans flew over into Norway. The only good thing about being a neutral country was that we could help our neighbors with food through the Red Cross. There were several warnings about evacuating Swedish children to the countryside, out of the cities.

My faith in God, my Lord, got its foundation at home as well as at the Hedvig Eleonora and Oskar churches, where Erik Bergman was senior pastor (father of the famous movie director, Ingmar Bergman). Now I understand the influences upon my life this contact had. When I was 15, Pastor Bergman confirmed me. I will always remember those loving, caring times and especially at the Christmas parties in the parish hall. This foundation of early faith became the cornerstone and sustenance of my life in the United States. A culture change can sometimes cause a slow and steady culture shock. New understanding must take place. As my grandfather used to preach: love and justice must prevail.

After high school (*gymnasiet*), my education continued at the

Karolinska Hospital to become a physical therapist, a profession I love. It enabled me to care for other people. In 1955, after two years as a registered therapist in different cities in Sweden, I went to London and the East-West End to work at a chest hospital. England still has a place in my heart with its gentle and unobtrusive ways, the rolling green hills, and the unmistakable sense of humor. While in London, I made arrangements to work in California to help rehabilitate the blind twins Jimmy and Jennifer. Jennifer needed the most help to strengthen her muscles, because she has CP, and I assisted her to prepare for school. Sharing life with these dear children, eight years old at the time, enriched my life beyond measure.

In 1961, the family and I spent a week at Echo Lake. I was introduced to Russ while sitting on a rock with pink curlers in my hair. We were married in December 1962 in San Francisco's Swedenborgian church. It has been a rich experience to share my life with another person as well as getting to know three stepdaughters and raise our two sons. My continued fellowship in the church and renewed faith in Jesus Christ as my Savior has enabled me to accomplish what life has put before me. Our sons are grown now; their formal education is finished and they are embarking on new jobs. As little boys, they were members of the children's club in which I also participated. Teaching Swedish in the lodge has become an added joy — not to forget the Swedish chorus. Russ and I love to be with our grandchildren, two boys and two girls. We are having fun. Tack så mycket!

We Need Letters!

We are running the risk of losing the popular SCOLA rebroadcast of the Swedish TV Channel 4 news in Swedish on our cable TV. The reason is that Swedish TV has not come up with the required written approval. This is one of very few opportunities for Swedish immigrants and descendants in America to get current Swedish news and cultural information.

Therefore, we need to get a letter-writing campaign going, asking that these rebroadcasts be continued. The letters should state that they come from Vasa Order members — preferably citing the number of people and their families our Vasa lodges represent — and cite the interest in and uses for these Swedish language programs. For instance, tapes of the programs would be excellent material for our Swedish study groups.


