

Member of the Month

The December Member of the Month is our chairman, Margaret (Holm) Carlson. Her parents were both born in Vasa, Finland, and came over here in their late teens and early twenties. Margaret was born, raised, and married in Mount Vernon, Washington, the oldest of four children and the only girl.

Margaret grew up on a large farm, where her parents raised registered Jerseys and grew grain and crops, such as peas, broccoli, and spinach for the freezer plants. Margaret often worked in the fields, running a tractor, or driving a big truck, vehicles she learned to drive when she was only 10. Margaret could only speak Swedish when she started grade school, so you know who was called "teacher's pet." She started going to Vasa meetings at an early age. Her mother was a 50-year member. Her dad died when he was only 63 years old.

Margaret learned to play the accordion and was in an accordion band that played in every parade you can think of in Washington and Canada. She also played at Vasa dances at the time when they danced after every meeting.

Margaret married Roland in 1942. They had four children and eventually moved to Eureka, California, where they lived for 20 years. The whole family was active in 4-H and won many awards. Margaret was even chosen by the Singer Sewing Machine Co. as one of four top 4-H clothing leaders in the United States and was honored at the National 4-H Congress in Chicago. She was also active in the PTA and was given Honorary Life Membership. To this day, she is active in the Beta Sigma Phi Sorority and American Business Women's Association.

Margaret and Roland designed and built a big home while the kids were growing up. When the oldest daughter started college, Margaret went to work full time as a bookkeeper and has worked off and on ever since.

But she always loved to cook and entertained a lot; there was always someone extra for dinner. She started making wedding cakes when friends were having anniversaries and the children got married. One weekend she had three wedding cakes to do besides working full time. She didn't know how to say "No" in those days either! She even had time to do oil painting, crafts, and tole. Margaret wasn't happy unless she was around lots of kids. In addition to their own, they also had foster children. She now has nine grandchildren.

Margaret and Roland moved to Sacramento in 1971 and eventually rejoined Vasa. And you all know the rest of the story . . .

Pumpkin Cake

Margaret Carlson made this cake for one of our recent meetings and many people asked for the recipe:

> 4 eggs 1 large can pumpkin 1¹/₂ cup sugar 1 tsp salt 2 tsp cinnamon ¹/₄ tsp allspice 1 tsp ginger ¹/₂ cloves 3 ¹/₂ cups evaporated milk

^{*} Mix all above ingredients and put in 9x3 pan. Sprinkle 1 pkg yellow cake mix over it all. Put $1\frac{1}{2}$ cubes butter slices on top and sprinkle 1 cup chopped walnuts over the cake.

Bake in 325° for $1\frac{1}{2}$ hour. Whipped cream is good topping.
