

1. Margaret Carlson called the meeting to order and roll was called.

- 4. Previous minutes were approved with minor corrections, one involving Sweden Day: there is no talk about discontinuing it entirely.
- 5. Marianne Ek has sent an article to the *Vasa Star* about our Swedish pea soup dinner.
- 6. The annual scholarship was increased from \$300 to \$500.

7. Lots of volunteers are needed for the Scandinavian Festival, including help with baked goods and to make the pancake batter.

8. Arlie Veis presented the report from the dues increase committee. The meeting discussed the Monitor's financial situation, including the nonprofitability of some events. The meeting voted to increase the dues from \$14 to \$18 effective immediately.

9. A catered Bar-B-Q anniversary dinner was discussed. Motion passed for the lodge to defray part of the cost of the meal for paid-up members. Members would have to pay only \$6.75 with others paying the full fare.

10. The secretary summarized 11 convention resolutions which will be voted on at the next meeting. Copies will be available at that time.

11. A motion passed to pay our delegates to the district meeting 12¢ per mile plus \$30 toward lodging.


12. The lodge will have access to an additional storage room at Wisteria Hall for our tables, the bar, sound equipment, etc.

The Dala Horse

Among the multitude of examples of Swedish folk art, few have attained such a long-lived and important status as a symbol for Sweden as *Dalahästen*, especially the one from Mora in the Dalarna province.

White, blue, or most commonly orange red, its popularity has spawned a whole cottage industry not only in Sweden but in parts of America as well. It decorates street signs, official vehicles and uniforms in Lindsborg in Kansas, Scandia in Minnesota, and Kingsburg in California. And the biggest dala horse is at home not in Mora, Sweden, but in Mora, Minnesota.

Little is known about the origins of the Dala horse. It supposedly came from Mora, but the carving of wooden horses probably was a folk art practiced in many parts of Sweden. Wood carving was a common pastime during the winter.

The Dala horse center of the world is now definitely in Nusnäs in Dalarna, where Nils Olsson Hemslöjd AB produces some 800,000 horses a year of all sizes. It is an industry, but one with no machinery except a band

saw that cuts out the blocks used as raw material for a horse. Every Nusnäs horse is handmade; the carvers work from home or at their own handicraft studios. The best can carve a horse in 6-8 minutes after many years of practice, but the old guard is approaching retirement age at a time when demand is constantly growing. Nusnäs recently advertised for apprentices for the first time in many years, and although woodcarving is not a thing that will make you rich, the response was nothing but astounding. The future of the craft seems assured.

The horses are finished off with the traditional rosemaling decorations. The horses are first painted with a base, dipped in two color baths, sanded, and then dipped in a final color bath before being decorated and varnished. The rosemaling is often done from home as well, and experienced painters are no less fast and skilled than the woodcarvers.
