Introducing

our Member of the Month, Marianne Ek!

I am not of Swedish descent but had the good sense to marry a Swede. Before I met Sven and learned a little about Sweden and the Swedes, my total cultural background was German and American. All four of my grandparents were Germans from the Ukraine.

I first met Sven when he came to visit with Mom and Richard. My father had died when I was a teenager. Sven and Richard were friends. For the next two years Sven was in Sweden most of that time. After celebrating my 21st birthday, I was rudely awakened by the loud sound of a hammer pounding. Thinking it was my younger brother, I raced to the door, yanked it open—and stopped in mid yell. It was Sven building forms for concrete. I quietly closed the door and didn't go near the back yard for the rest of the day.

Several months later, I had made reservations at a nice restaurant for Mom and Dick for their first anniversary dinner. I had broken up with my boyfriend and was dateless. So Richard called Sven and I began to learn about Swedes. During the evening, I asked him if he had any brothers or sisters. He replied that if I would go to the movies with him the next night, he would tell me the name of one of



his brothers. He asked me to please not wear red (guess what I was wearing) which was his least favorite color. On that first date I learned about Lars—next Ernst, Nils, and Karl. But I was getting suspicious. How many more, I asked. He chuckled: "Only Olaf. But then there are my sisters Elin, Greta, and Svea." It took me six months to pronounce Sven Uno Ek to his satisfaction. In the process of all this getting acquainted, we danced until the last dance at Crow Canyon, Café du Nord, Linnea lodge, and Sons of Norway. Almost the entire membership of Vasa

and Sons of Norway were related by birth, marriage, or through the construction industry: everyone knew everyone else.

When we married, we immediately joined Vasa where his brother Lars and sister-in-law were members. Being interested in music, I took to Swedish music like a duck to water. Sven would come home and hear me try to sing with the records and could stop laughing at my pronunciation only long enough to try to teach me a few words. I fell in love with Swedish food—except for herring. The first time I mentioned cooking a turkey for Christmas, I thought Sven looked a little pale. So then we had turkey for Thanksgiving and ham for Christmas.

We had two children, Mary Kristina and Sven Erik. In 1970, my world fell apart, and I moved to Sacramento to be near my parents. I feel I have to make the best of everything. I can express my personal heritage through the Sacramento Turner Harmonie (German choir) and my love of things Swedish with my rejoining Vasa and the Valley Viking Singers. Languages, cooking, people, music and much more interest me. I am thankful for the many lovely people I have met at Monitor and hope that I will continue to grow and learn my whole life.

Sweden's National Day

On the occasions of Sweden's National Day on June 6, here an historic look a the Swedish flag:

The Swedish flag was originally a royal banner used by King Karl Knutsson Bonde in his wards against the Danes during the 1400s. The yellow cross long remained strictly a royal symbol but Swedish ships started using the "three-tongue" flag for protection at sea. Private ships were vulnerable, but the state flag, they thought, might fool pirates into believing that the ship was an armed Navy vessel. The first flag law was enacted in 1663 and remained in force until 1815 when the union with Norway complicated matters. The Norweigans believed in a "clean" flag, but the union designation was incorporated into all flags in Sweden until Norway's independence in 1905. Flying the flag on land remained uncommon long into the 19th century. The flag was generally considered a state symbol that should not be used by private individuals.

At the start of the 1871 Parliament session, a flag pole was raised on the Parliament building in Stockholm. The flag was flown whenever Parliament (Riksdagen) was in session. The custom to fly the Swedish flag spread slowly to government and other official buildings and schools. Towards the end of the 1800s, individuals began more and more to fly a flag on special occasions. However, the colors were different: the blue color was of a darker shade and the yellow was almost orange.

The first spring festival in the outdoor animal and history park Skansen in Stockholm was held in 1893. The festivities ended with a big flag demonstration on June 6, the date which would become Sweden's national day 90 years later. In the meantime, Flag Day became a big annual celebration in which thousands of school children eventually participated, each one waving a small flag. As Europe as a continent changes in the future, it will be even more important for the various populations to know their regional history and preserve regional symbols.

The Greened Midsummer Pole



Midsommar is a uniquely Nordic sunworshipping ceremony harkening back to pagan times. Traditionally, it begins in Sweden on

the Friday between the 19th and 25th of June and lasts through the weekend, so Midsummer is celebrated on June 23-25 this year. This issue of our newsletter, therefore, seems a good time to discuss some confusion about the name of the midsummer pole. The Swedish word majstång is often translated "maypole," which is not surprising since maj is the Swedish word for the month of May. There is an obvious inconsistency here, however, for midsummer is in June, not in May. The explanation lies in the fact that majstång means literally "greened pole" from the old Swedish verb maja meaning "to make green." Since spring comes late in Scandinavia, the month which became green, the fifth month of the Gregorian calendar, derived its name, too, from maja, to "make green."

Majning (pronounced "mining")—the use of freshly cut greens to deck doors, steps, and cottage walls and ceilings, even the local church itself, in addition to the pole (majstång) erected in the farmyard—likely has its roots deep in Swedish folk belief. In the earliest runic alphabet (predating the year 1,000), the sign of a branch denotes Midsummer Day. Numerous written accounts of the practice of midsummer greening go back to the early

1600s, and it is considered improbable that such a near-pagan ritual would have been tolerated by the strict 17th century clergy had it not by that time already become a firmly established folk tradition.

Specific times and details of the ceremony vary with local customs, as does the design of the midsummer pole itself. Examples of the greened midsummer pole are rare outside Sweden and Finland. In Norway and Denmark the summer solstice is marked by the lighting of bonfires on the eve before, followed by "general merrymaking."
