#### **Beet Salad**

Here is the popular beet salad Louise Centers brought to our *smörgåsbord* in December:

2 cans julienne style beets 1 can (20 oz) crushed pineapple 3/8 cup vinegar 2 tbls sugar 6 oz box raspberry Jello 1 cup walnuts Juice from 2 lemons

Drain the juice from beets and pineapple. Add vinegar, sugar, and juice from lemons making sure you have 4 cups liquid only (add water if necessary). Bring to a boil. Add Jello and let dissolve. Add remaining ingredients and let set.

#### The Viking Ship (See cover page)

The Vikings ruled the seas from 800 to 1050 AD. It's no wonder that the design and sturdiness of the boats has been the subject of many studies. There is no doubt that the Vikings really mastered the art of boatmaking, and the navigation standards they achieved remained unmatched until the beginning of this century. Besides having perfect lines and being seaworthy, Viking ships had a great deal of agility. The Vikings were able to spin their ships around almost on their axis during battles.

Most of the ships were 55-90 feet long and were used either as cargo ships, warships, or ferries. The typical design stressed lightness and resilience. Other classic features included tapered ends with a smoothly curved transition between keep and stern. The ship was steered by a lateral rudder placed at the stern end on the right side of the navigation direction. The propelling force was a combination of sails and oars. The ship had one mast and one rectangular sail. The difference between warships and merchant ships lay in their width. Merchants were wide and depended more on the wind than on manpower. Because warships had to be fast, they were low and narrow and their oar holes ran the full length of the ship, hamessing both the wind and the strength of the crew. The best examples of Viking ships today can be seen at the Viking Ship Museum in Roskilde in Denmark.


So revered were their treasured vessels, the Vikings had them buried with them as they made the trip to Valhalla, their afterlife.

#### North America Discovered

In 1497, some fishermen discovered what is today called Newfoundland. Its capital, St. Johns, is the oldest town in North America. However, 510 years earlier—in the year 987—a Viking by the name of Leif had sailed into Pistolet Bay. He called the area Vinland and stayed over the winter, sailing back to Greenland the following spring.

In 1002, Thorfin Karlsefni sailed to Vinland with 160 men and 5 women in 4 ships, intending to settled down. According to the legends, the vikings were




repeatedly attached by the native inhabitants and returned to Greenland after three years.

The village they had built was situated at a place now called L'Anse aux Meadows—the only place in North America where we have proof that Vikings lived there. At L'Anse aux Meadows, there is now a national park with an excellent exhibition hall. Eight viking houses were excavated but have again been covered up to preserve them for the future. Instead, three new houses have been built with the same materials used by the Vikings. The houses look the same as the original houses to give visitors an idea of what it looked like when the Vikings lived there.

L'Anse is worth a visit. Icebergs float by quietly and, if you're lucky, you may see whales. Visitors can follow "the Viking trail" to L'Anse aux Meadows and sail in a reconstructed viking ship.
