

1. Minutes from the February 14 meeting were approved as published.



- 2. New members Gary and Helen Baker and Michael Churkin, Jr., were initiated.
- 3. Dorothy Scherer had called on Millie Johnson who has suffered compound fracture and broken shoulder. Martha Fredrikson was scheduled for surgery. Dorothy and Myrtle Widmark had gone to San Anselmo to visit Dorothy Erickson.
- 4. Monitor is hoping to display its historical regalia at the district convention in April.
- 5. Two more membership applications were received.
- 6. Christi Kagstrom thanked Nål och Tråd for letting the children's club sell craft items at the Lucia celebration.
- 7. The scholarship committee had received one application that must be returned by March 15. Ericka Lewis is moving to Southern California and resigned from the committee.
- 8. The Valley Viking Singers will be performing at the Scandinavian Festival. The group is looking for more singers.
- 9. Helen Tura donated books, some of which were sold to our Swedish language students. The money is being used for library supplies.
- 10. Myrtle Widmark and Arlie Veis reported on preparations for the Scandinavian Festival on April 13. Baked goods are very much needed.
- 11. Birgitta Ostlund will purchase a TV. We have a donated stand.

- 12. Don Stafford and John Wright moved all Monitor supplies and historical material from the old shed to temporary space rented by the Wrights. A 5x5 or 5x10 unit will be rented by the lodge as permanent storage. The Children's Club also has material to be stored in this unit.
- 13. The lodge is now saving at least \$20 a month because the Children's Club is meeting in Christi Kagstrom's home.
- 14. A budget-tracking book has been set up for input to the 1997 budget.
- 15. Correspondence included four convention resolutions, a thank-you note from Donna Niemoller, and a letter from District Master Curt Pfannkuch. The district still needs an Assistant District Secretary and a Cultural Leader.

### Sweden Day Picnic Books Change

Whereas the Sweden Day Picnic Planning Day has been changed to October of each year,

Article 20 now reads:

(a) The books of the District Lodge shall be closed as of December 31st of each year

Be it resolved that Article 20 shall read:

- (a) The books of the District Lodge shall be closed as of December 31st of each year, except for the Sweden Day Fund.
  - (1) The Sweden Day Fund Books shall be closed as of September 30 of each year prior to the Sweden Day Picnic Planning Meeting in October.

**Motivation:** It is good business practice to have books closed and audited on a fiscal basis coinciding with the activity and change of officers.

At this time the Sweden Day secretary (the Vice District Secretary) is elected in April at Convention, the treasurer elected in October at Sweden Day Picnic Planning Meeting and Sweden Day held the following June. At present the books would be audited in January before the new activity and after the new treasurer takes office. All this is obviously very confusing; we are proposing to close the books by September 30 and plan an audit prior to the Sweden Day Picnic Planning Meeting when a new treasurer takes office. This audited report would be the financial report published in the following year's Convention Book.

### **Traveling Expenses**

Be it resolved to amend the District By-Laws, Article 15 - Traveling Expenses, Section (d). Page 6.

Now reads:

"(d) The traveling expense shall be computed at the rate of ten cents (10 cents) per mile and figured by the District mileage chart."

#### AMEND to read:

"(d) The traveling expense shall be computed a the rate of fifteen (15 cents) per mile and figured by the District mileage chart."

MOTIVATION: Traveling expense reimbursement has been at 10 cents per mile for over ten years. This increase would help defray the increased cost in transportation.

COST: In 1995 the additional cost with adoption of this change would have been a 50% increase from \$1060 to \$1590. The cost mainly depends upon the site of the District Convention.

This resolution is presented by the District Executive Board, moved at its regular meeting on February 3, 1996.

Article 17 - District General Fund

Add Section (d)

(d) An account within the District General Fund that has been inactive for a period of two (2) full years shall terminate and be returned to the District General Fund at the close of the second fiscal year following the year in which the last activity occurred.

#### **MOTIVATION:**

This section permits the release of funds back to the District General Fund in a timely manner once the purpose of a designated account has been fulfilled. These left-over funds are then available for other worthy purposes, for example, additional scholarships or for the District Charity. Passing this section would mean that at the close of Fiscal Year 1996 three (3) designated accounts will be returned to the District General Fund: the Library Account, the Spring Festival Account and the Swedish Traveler Account, thus making more than \$2700 available for other purposes.
