# "Scandinavian Week" for Elderhostelers

We were welcomed to the Pacific Lutheran University (PLU) at Takoma, Washington (just south of Seattle), in mid-June for an educational and fellowship adventure for older adults.

The elderhostel organization offers one-week general learning programs in colleges across the United States and even around the world.

Our week was on the PLU campus where we lived in a college dormitory and took the three daily classes at the Student Center Building. Our special class room was in the Scandinavian Cultural Center on the lower floor. Upstairs was the cafeteria where three daily meals were served, and they were great. You could eat as little or as much as you wanted. The meal times also offered an opportunity for meeting new people and having a good time of fellowship. Sometimes, a person would be from the town you went to school in.



Our classes involved the five Scandinavian countries. "Songs of Norway" was the history of

Norwegian music and some composers. We even did a little singing, both in Norwegian and English. A college music student sang for us in one class period.

Another class was on Scandinavian stories with the class leader reading parts of books written by different Scandinavian authors.

The history of Iceland was presented by another instructor.

For Denmark, we heard lectures on the history, government, and other facets of life in that country. One day, we were served real Danish refreshments.

A special time was in the class about Norwegian national costumes (bunader) and their history. A costume display was shown on the platform.

The class on Sweden surveyed the Kingdom of Sweden, past and present. The lectures were also directed to the landscape, climate, and geography and how they affected Swedish culture and society.

The topic on Finland was given by a local Finnish minister (with a Finnish accent) and he talked about the country's culture, activities, and the Lutheran church.

We also took a bus tour to Mt. Rainer and the Tacoma area.

The last night was a special dinner banquet, and many elderhostel students were part of the program.

The group was housed in log cabins in a beautiful, wooded area on a lake. Classes in Swedish, with lectures, films and videos on Sweden, were offered. 
