#### Swedish Folk Art

The Craft and Folk Art Museum in Los Angeles has been having a Swedish Folk Art Exhibition, "All Tradition is Change,"Nov 9-Jan 26. Myrtle Widmark visited this exhibit while in Los Angeles in early December. An article on the front page of the December 15 issue of *Vestkusten* showed one of the exhibits. The Jan-Feb issue of the *Motorland* magazine also covered the exhibit on pages 50-51.

The exhibition included carved and painted furniture, embroidered and woven textiles, costumes, baskets, tableware, and iron sculpture.

Folk art of the indigenous Saami people was exhibited, relating to the eight seasons of the Saami year which revolves around the life cycle of the reindeer herds. The exhibition also contained contemporary artworks by distinguished Swedish artists. A special feature for children was an interactive, hands-on playhouse.

#### **Death of Prince Bertil**

On 6 January, *The Sacramento Bee* carried a notice of the death of Prince Bertil, uncle of Sweden's King Carl XVI Gustaf and widely popular for his promotion of athletics. He was 84. Prince Bertil was part of the sixth generation of the French Bernadotte family that ascended to the Swedish throne in 1818. He was a great-grandson of Britain's Queen Victoria.

## **Swedes Live Longer**

than all other European Union citizens. They also drink least alcohol in the EU and come second in the non-smoking league, after the Portuguese.

The average Swede drank 6.4 liters alcohol in 1993 compared to, for example, the French and Portuguese who drank 17.7 liters per capita.

The Swedish man has the longest life expectancy in the EU at 75.4 years, compared to 70.7 years for the Portuguese man, EU's lowest. Swedish women come second in the age league at 80.8 years of life expectancy. The French women live longest at 81.5 years.

## Skål

In 1928, an American described

the Swedish skål like this:"Take the schnapps glass in your right hand. Keep your elbow at an 87 degree angle and move it forward halfway between chin and waist. lean forward, and with a facial ex-



pression of a bored cow, say 'skål' as you lift the glass and empty the schnapps, counting to 10. Bending your elbow again, lower the glass, nod your head, count to 10 again. It's a charming tradition."
