The Dala Horse *

Few tourists leave Sweden without a smallfour-sided, orange-colored trinket of a horse with uprights ears and multicolored saddle decorations. The Dala Horse has become Sweden's most popular symbol and the most endearing exponent of its folk art.

Very little is known about the origins of the Dala horse, but the carving of wooden horses for boys and wooden dolls for girls probably was a folk art practiced not only in the province of Dalarna but in many parts of Sweden. As early as in 1624, Bishop Johannes Rudbeckius in Västerås in a sermon is upset about the market sales of among other things "wooden horses" that can only lead to vanity in its owners.

The origins of woodcarving in this fashion can be traced back to the lumberjacks' log-cabins as early as the 18th century. The **lumber**jacks would sit around the open fires during winter, resting after the day's tree felling and transporting of logs and relaxing by carving figures from odd pieces of wood. The popular choice to carve was a horse. The lumberjacks would then take these wooden horses back to the villages where they became muchtreasured toys for the children.

Around the town of Mora in Dalarna (or Dalecarlia in English), it became customary to paint the wooden horses with richly colored flower patterns like the Dala paintings that decorated furniture and interior walls. The people from this region who traveled about the country to sell products of the cottage industry—such as baskets, grinding stones, and wooden casks—often took Dala horses with them to add to their selection of goods. They were also often used as payment for board and lodging. It was not by accident that the horse came to be the most popular animal to carve. The horse was very valuable, a tower of strength and a great asset for any family.

There were many well-known carvers, such as Jones Anna Ersdotter (1844-1901) and her sons whose artistic horses command high prices at auctions today. The first Dala painter to use the characteristic technique of painting the horses with two different colors in the same brush was Stikå Erik Hansson (1823-1897) who emigrated to America with his son and is buried in Nebraska. Today, most of Sweden's Dala horses in sizes from 3 to 75 centimeters are carved by two competing enterprises in Nusnäs. Nils Olsson Hemslöjd, started by a couple of teenagers in 1928, produces some 800,000 horses a year. First the shape of the horse is cut out from a wooden block before a carver takes over, finishing the carving in as little as six minutes. Just like in the past, the carving is generally done by pensioners and handicapped people in their homes, while the dipping of the horses in color baths and the final decorations and varnishing takes place in a more industrial setting.

The world-wide popularity of the Dala horse started when architecture professor Sven Markelius placed a large bright red horse outside the Swedish pavilion at the 1939 World's Fair in New York. People flocked to the horses on sale inside—and to the Swedish *smörgåsbord* also made famour by this exhibition

Lindsborg in Kanses is almost as attached to the Data Horse as Mora in Sweden. There are horses on light poles, taxis, ambulances, fire engines, and even the city seal. The same goes for Scandia and Mora in Minnestora and Kingsburg in California, where even McDonalds has adopted the Swedish theme.

What and Where Is Scandinavia?

Scandinavia (ancient *Scandia*), name applied collectively to three countries of northern Europe: Norway and Sweden (which together form the Scandinavian Peninsula), and Denmark. The three countries are so grouped because of their historical, cultural, and linguistic affinities. The term Scandinavia is sometimes extended to include Iceland, which is linguistically related to the others, and less often to Finland, which is not linguistically related. The term Nordic has been applied to the five countries of northern Europe (Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Finland, and Iceland) that are united by geographical and economic factors.


