Condensed Minutes from Business Meeting, February 10, 1999

(Full minutes available from Secretary David Benson)

- 1. The pea soup and pancake dinner was profitable. Exact figures will be available at the next meeting. Seating for members and 29 guests was a problem and has become an issue at other events also. A discussion ensued on proposals for speeding up the food line or the serving, such as taking plates to the tables and having double lines for buffets.
- 2. In the case of double memberships, the District Board has made it clear that full dues are paid at each lodge and full District and Grand Lodge assessments are paid by both lodges. Assessments total \$15.96 out of our annual \$18 dues.
- 3. Membership applications were approved and initiations will be held at the March meeting.
- 4. The meeting voted to purchase and deliver floral presentations to home-bound members for Easter.
- 5. A letter of congratulations on behalf of Monitor will be sent the Barbro Osher, who has succeeded Siri Eliason as Honorary Consul General.
- 6. Carol Churkin presented ideas for coming cultural programs, including current issues in Sweden, singing and music, the Children's Club, and dancing.
- 7. 25-, 50-, and 60-year pins will be ordered and presented at the lodge anniversary dinner.

- 4. Reservations will be needed for the anniversary dinner, which will be catered by a lodge member.
- 5. Sierra Kronan has volunteered to work with Monitor in a joint venture if Monitor accepts responsibility for hosting the District Convention in 2002 or 2003.
- 6. Interest was expressed in giving special recognition on 80th and 90th birthdays, including special mention in the newsletter.
- 7. Until the policy has been changed, the Scholarship Committee will be awarding scholarships only to graduating highschool seniors.
- 8. Monitor has been given the following tasks for the April Scandinavian Festival: Be in

charge of making sandwiches; serving coffee; bringing pancake batter and frying pancakes; and managing the craft tables. The Viking Valley Singers have been asked to sing. Baked goods are needed, and reimbursement for

expenses for materials in baking or making pancake batter can be requested.

Swedish-Danish Connection

After three years, the 4,050 meter tunnel under Öresund from Denmark towards Sweden has been completed, six to eight weeks ahead of schedule. According to plans, it will open for traffic on 1 July 2000. The tunnel ends at a small island, Peberholm, from which a bridge will provide the final connection to Sweden.

This is a four-partition tunnel: two tunnels for car traffic, one towards Sweden and one towards Denmark, and two tunnels for trains, one in each direction.

The Vikings Are Coming!

Since The Vasa Order of America has pronounced 1999 "The Year of the Viking," here's description of the Vikings and their activities from the Microsoft Encarta Encyclopedia

Vikings is the collective designation of Nordic people — Danes, Swedes, and Norwegians — who explored abroad during a period of



dynamic Scandinavian expansion from about AD 800 to 1100. Land shortage, improved iron production, and the need for new markets probably all played a part in Viking expansion. The Viking Age is commonly associated with unbridled piracy, but not every Scandinavian was a professional warrior or Viking, and not every Viking was a pirate.

The first recorded Viking raid was a seaborne assault in 793 by Norwegian marauders on the Holy Island of Lindisfarne, off the northeast coast of England. Growing evidence indicates that considerable overseas Viking migration occurred long before then. Swedish entrepreneurs penetrated the Russian hinterland, founding city-states and opening the way to Constantinople (present-day Istanbul) and the markets of Arabia and East Asia. Danish warriors fought the crumbling Carolingian Empire—Hamburg, Dorestad, Rouen, Paris, Nantes, Bordeaux—until in 911 one of the armies accepted by treaty the area of Normandy (Normandie) in northern France and settled there.

In the 11th century, Vikings briefly established a Scandinavian empire of the North Sea, composed of England, Denmark, and Norway. Norwegian adventurers and Danish Vikings discovered and settled uninhabited lands in the Atlantic—first the Faroes, then Iceland, then Greenland. From Greenland they attempted to settle on North America's eastern seaboard, but they soon abandoned these attempts. Franco-Viking descendants conquered England in 1066 and Sicily from 1060 to 1090.

The lasting impact of the Vikings was less enduring than might have been expected. In general, they had a great capacity for being assimilated into local populations. The settlers brought to the British Isles energetic art forms, new farming techniques, mercantile acumen, and a vigorous language. They introduced new forms of administration and justice, and in Iceland, Vikings produced the great medieval literature of the sagas.

In their time, the Vikings had crisscrossed half the world in their open boats and vastly extended its horizons. Having achieved that, however, they had neither the manpower nor the staying power, neither the reserves of wealth nor the political experience, neither the cohesion at home nor the confidence abroad to master effectively the older, richer, more stable states they tried to overrun. Their dynamism was gradually exhausted and even their swift, magnificent ships were superseded, replaced by much lager, more prosaic vessels better suited to bulk cargo carrying.
