

Olof Rudbeck, Sr., is one of Uppsala University's most outstanding figures throughout the centuries. He was the son of a bishop from Västerås and entered the University at a tender age. Medical education was not especially advanced at Uppsala at the time, but the young Rudbeck made what has been called 'the first scientific discovery by a Swede,' the lymphatic gland and its diffusion in the human body.

A Danish scientist had made roughly the same discoveries at the same time, and the two gentlemen naturally wound up at odds with each other about which one of them had been first. At any rate, Rudbeck had performed a scientific feat and as a young man made a name for himself among the learned in Europe.

After a period abroad Rudbeck returned to Uppsala, and in 1660 he was appointed to one of the chairs at the Faculty of Medicine (at that time there were only two). He held the post until 1692, when he was succeeded by his son, Olof Rudbeck, Jr. On several occasions he was rector magnificus of the University.

As an expression of his ambitions in medicine, in the early 1660s he had a Theatrum anatomicum built, for dissections of human cadavers. It is easy to imagine what a bold move this was, to build something so large right on top of the university's main building, that is, the Gustavianum. This cupola with its sundial still today lends the building its special character.

Otherwise Rudbeck became best known for his book Atlantica, an extremely patriotic account of ancient history, today largely regarded as learned fantasies. But many other aspects of Rudbeck's work have been of lasting value. To-


gether with the Chancellor, Magnus Gabriel De la Gardie, he introduced the socalled 'exercitia.' They meant that young students from the nobility received training in useful pursuits such as riding, dancing, fencing, modern languages, etc. The riding academy that Rudbeck had built stood where University Hall now stands, and academic training in riding is still provided. He also arranged to have a botanical garden established (the present-day Linnæan Garden), set up boat connections with Stockholm, built bridges and aqueducts, etc. He was also a composer and had a fantastic singing voice, and he sometimes performed in the cathedral.

This Recipe received a "Smackar" *Award at the March Meeting Tack, Eivor


Bruna Bröd or Brown Bread Cookies

2 ¼ sticks of butter
1 cup of sugar
1 tablespoon of dark Karo syrup or Mörk Sirap (from Ikea)
1 egg
3 ½ cups of flour
2 teaspoons of baking soda
2 teaspoons of cinnamon
1 teaspoon of cardamom
Pearl Sugar (from Ikea)

Mix all ingredients together. Put some pearl sugar on a plate. Take a piece of the dough and make a ball, the size of a small Swedish meat ball. Flatten the ball in the plate of pearl sugar and put the flattened ball, pearl sugar up, on a cookie sheet. Repeat until all dough is used.

Bake in 375 degree oven for 5 – 7 minutes. * Svenskt uppslagsord smackar smackade smackat smacka(!) verb smälla med läpparna eller tungan <A smackar>

This is not a Christian tradition; it is much older than that. No one knows the original purpose of the bonfires. Ascention day - 17th of May, 2007

The Ascension is a holiday in Sweden and one of the great feasts in the Christian liturgical calendar, and commemorates the Ascension of Jesus Christ into Heaven forty days after His resurrection from the dead. The event is recorded in the New

MEET KAREN SANDBERG

(Karen said yes when "Cub Reporter" Carol Neswich asked for a Bio! We all benefit)

Where do I begin to tell the tales of a Swedish life just begun?

I remember Christmas Eve dinners at the home of my father's sister - Aunt Doris - and her husband - Uncle Benny. I still can see my Aunt in the kitchen, in her apron and slippers, her hair always beautiful, her nose and walk I have acquired, waiting for the rest of the family to arrive while my Uncle tended the log on the fire. This Aunt and Uncle graciously opened their home year after year - providing memories for me that I will forever cherish.

Candles glowing softly on the dinner table, while others were strategically placed on tables throughout the house out of the reach of little hands, the sounds of the songs on the album "I Just Go Nuts At Christmas," the crunch of the ginger and spritz cookies so carefully made, the warm rice pudding fresh out of the oven, the saltiness of the pickled herring with hard crackers, the Swedish beans stirred with love and flavored so particularly each year, however, consistently served in the same cherished hand-painted floral porcelain bowl, the Swedish potato sausage, all served on white porcelain dishes. Root beer was a staple and the evening is not Christmas Eve without it. Impatiently waiting after my sisters and brother and I finished our meal for the women to complete the task of washing dishes (this is before the invention of an automatic dishwasher!). We thought Easter would be here and gone

before mom and Aunt Doris let us know it is time for "Santa" to deliver the packages.

The Christmas tree decorated so perfectly every year with the tender care of my Aunt and Uncle. Pajamas also were a welcome staple and as soon as found were put on and worn for the trip home. Many nights we could imagine Santa's reindeer attempting to find their way through the fog. Too often we drove through the infamous Tule Fog of the Central Valley to navigate our way home.

I do not recall when or where I realized that I was of Swedish heritage, or that Sweden was a country far, far away. However, I do recall around 9 years of age that Sweden was a place I longed to see. I am saddened that I have not heard the sounds of Sweden uttered from my American relatives, I am saddened that I lost my father's mother when I was so young. My mom says that of my siblings I resemble my Grandmother Elizabeth the most.

My father's mother (Elizabeth Lindberg) only lived to be 67. I was about 4. My father's father (Edwin/Edward Sandberg) was not much on conversation even though he lived to be 91.

Both sets of my father's grandparents (Frank and Annie Lindberg and Augusta and David Sandberg) emigrated from Sweden during the 1880's and 1890's. Chicago and Minnesota are also my claim to fame. People who had the ability to share their stories of the "Old Country" were gone long before I arrived. I nave always wondered what it is to be Swedish and why I am the way I am.

I had the fortune of following my heart to Sacramento and finding Birgitta Ellis through a co-worker. Through my attempts at learning how to speak Swedish via lessons from Birgitta I listened to the stories of Sverige. That was all it took. I was on a mission to make my way to the land of my ancestors.

The summer of 2006 was "An Incredible Journey."

I found relatives that I never knew existed with the assistance of Marie Louise Bratt and her company "Bridge to Sweden." We traveled through Småland and visited a "Sandberg" farm that has been in the "Sandberg" family for over 300 years. The children living on the farm now are 7th generation. I saw Swedish brown and white cows, met people who are still connected to the land; I saw stonewalls, and listened to the stories of how those walls came to be, was bitten by innumerable mosquitoes, met some incredible people and I am connected by the blood that runs through our veins.

I celebrated Midsommer. I picked fresh lettuce and midsummer flowers. I met Primus – the Gotland pony. I tasted homemade schnapps. A dear woman made a wreath of midsummer

flowers for me. I learned about "All Man's Land" and that people are responsible, and accountable for his or her own actions. I walked upon land tread by my forefathers. I looked up and around and walked forward and backward trying to take it all in. All the time wondering how will I ever commit this to memory and remember every step I took.

I can only imagine the heartache of leaving the only land and language and customs known to never see your father, or mother, or brothers, or sisters ever again. If the land you love is unable to nourish your body - the only option many had was to search for a better life. America afforded this opportunity. It causes my heart to ache to have walked this land and imagine tearing yourself away from all that you know - to go to a strange land with strange people and strange sights and sounds. I have a great respect for these emigrants. The history of the Vikings and the churches, and the people and their country is something of which I am extremely proud.

I met people who look similar to my family. A distant cousin could be a twin to my father. A cousin has hands such as my father and brother. The inquisitive looks, and wonderment, and tears of joy at meeting relatives across such a great ocean are so difficult to describe. I will never forget the sights, sounds, and precious moments that I experienced in this home of my long lost family.

This began the journey of my Swedish Life.

I have such a yearning to learn about my father's family – I still need to discover the family of Elizabeth Lindberg – and her parents – Frank and Annie. I have feelings pulling me back again to the land of my fathers. This is just one journey of many that I plan on making.

Bless you all for the work that you do so people such as myself may find some connection with the long ago past of which I long to call my own.
