

**Swedish News, History, & Geneology.** This is an interesting item that Lodge member Dick Baldwin recently forwarded. Although the event in question has taken place, it provides a nice summary of the talk he gave to Lodge members earlier in the year about research on his Swedish ancestors.

I'd like to invite you to tune in the radio program of one of my high school classmates: Dr. Ron Willis, a Southern Baptist minister whose ministry has included churches in Oakland, CA; Bangor, ME, and San Antonio, TX, and who now hosts the 'This Week in Politics' show on radio station KSVY, 91.3 FM in Sonoma, California.

My 2nd Great Grandfather, Nils Bourkersson, will be one of two guests on Ron's program feature, "Class of 1958: Where They Are Now." Nils will be interviewed, along with me at 1 p.m. on Thursday, October 15th, 2015. Let me explain:

My recent trip to Scandinavia was born of a genealogical interest that began several decades ago as I began to wonder about my ancestry. I have researched various lines back to the sixteenth century as they came from such countries as Sweden, Norway, Germany, Scotland, England, France, Wales and Ireland.

Several years ago, I posted my ancestry on the Internet, including reference to my  $2^{nd}$  great grandfather, Nils Bourkersson who, according to my research, had traveled from his native Sweden to Utah in a Mormon Emigration, though he was not Mormon and thus referred





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to himself as a 'heathen.' After three and a half years of absence from Sweden, he returned to his fatherland a broken man, and wrote a book about his travels, entitled 'Tre år I Mormonlandet' (Three Years in Mormon Country). It was a book that I had hoped to read some day, but the only extant copy of the book was, at the time, in the Malmo, Sweden library.

In recent years, I received an Email from Ulla-Karin Alsvold, a cemetery and family researcher in Skåne, Sweden. Ulla-Karin had noticed my ancestral posting and was interested in having Nils' book translated. I volunteered to attempt the feat even though I could read or speak no Swedish. She then copied the entire book, page by page, and sent it to me by post. Since I had always had an interest in reading the book, my desire had been partially fulfilled, without a visit to the Malmo library.

I soon realized the enormity of the project, however, since I knew I would have to learn the Swedish language in order to translate the book. I took on the project with fervor and began my quest. I ordered a three level Rosetta Stone Svenska Language Program, along with a Swedish-English and English-Swedish dictionary and, most important, a Babylon translation software program for the Swedish language. I later supplemented those tools with another program, Transparent Language, and ordered their 'Swedish Word of the Day' through that program.

I eventually learned, however, that the Swedish language in the 1860s, when Nils wrote his book, had undergone major changes in the early part of the 20<sup>th</sup> century, with multiple changes in spelling and word usage. Therefore his words were not easily recognized by the Babylon software program, nor found in the dictionary. Furthermore, the book was written in a gothic script, which made identifying some letters difficult.

It took me about three years to translate about half of Nils Bourkersson's book, but in very rudimentary fashion. I felt the project was slowly grinding to a halt when I talked to a 90-year old cousin in Salt Lake City, who said "I had that book translated about 15 years ago." After some discussion, she volunteered to send it to me by Email, and I decided to make a trip to Sweden to report my findings to Ulla-Karin. That decision eventually included four nights in Stockholm, a week in a time share in Nils' area of Skåne in southern Sweden, a five-night Norway Fjord cruise and four nights in Copenhagen, Denmark. Since I had previously visited Helsinki, Finland in 2010, I felt I had the credentials to call myself a Scandinavian Explorer.

Nils' story is a rather dramatic and tragic one, and important in the history of early Mormon immigration. Although Nils died in 1868, I hope to coax him out of his grave to explain to Ron and his radio audience the essence of his tragic, non-Mormon life.
