## A trip to remember

# Swedish holiday serves tradition to American girl

We're asking readers to share memories of a cherished vacation. This letter is from Deborah Metour of Citrus Heights.

At Christmastime in 2003, I decided to visit the "old country." Although I had been several times since I had emigrated in 1965, I had never visited during this season.

Since my 10-year-old granddaughter. Phoenix-Haven Metour, is very interested in learning to speak Swedish and to learn about Swedish customs and culture (the only one in my American family who is!), I decided to take her with me.

Before our trip, Phoenix-Haven participated in the Scandinavian Vasa Lodge's "Santa Lucia" Christmas program, where she sang in Swedish, solo, for the congregation.

On Dec.23, about 20 hours after leaving Sacramento, we landed at Copenhagen airport, then took the train to the town nearest to where my mother lives in the middle of the woods in Sweden. It was exciting to see and to travel by train over the new bridge linking Denmark and Sweden. I always had to travel by ferry before.

The Swedish countryside was lovely with newly fallen snow that covered the forests, fields and farms scattered here and there. The homes and villages were all lit up with Christmas lights - all white - in the windows and on the streets.

My brother picked us up and drove us to my mother's house. It was dark in the forest but suddenly before our eyes appeared a beautiful log cabin filled with lights and a big Christmas tree on the porch lit up with electric candles. The inside had been beautifully decorated for Christmas by my youngest brother, Rolf, and his girlfriend, Maritha.

My mother is blind now, but she hears well. She loved meeting Phoenix-Haven, her American great-grandchild, and always wanted her small hand to lead her about.

On Christmas Eve we celebrated with a traditional lutefisk dinner - dry cod soaked in lye, then watered out and boiled. It is soft and slimy and has no taste. Only the Swedes like it. Phoenix-Haven had ham and chicken - no American girl has to eat lutefisk!

On Christmas day we visited my dad, who lives in the beautiful coastal city of Karlshamn. He was so happy to see us. We had the big Christmas smorgasbord with friends and relatives.

After the holidays we walked in the woods on my mother's property, going to the lake where I used to fish as a kid. The air was clean. My mother has lived on this land for more than 60 years. The old tree I used to climb is still there, along with my childhood home, built in 1917.

Although the lights on the tree are electric now, not the candles we had before, and the livestock is not there anymore either, it was wonderful to be back home for Christmas. I felt like 1 had my first real Christmas after 39 years away, and to see it through Phoenix Haven's eyes was wonderful.
