How good is your Swedish vocabulary? ? If you want to brush up on your Swedish you have several options: we have Monitor's in-person/ZOOM Swedish language classes led by Will Hanley. In addition to the on-line tutorials utilized by some of Will's students at Innovative Languages (<u>https://www.innovativelanguage.com/</u>) you will find Swedish vocabulary and lessons in Nordstjernan (<u>http://www.nordstjernan.com/</u>) and in the Swedish edition of The Local (<u>https://www.thelocal.se/</u>). You can also get a language fix from bi-weekly podcasts at: <u>https://shows.acast.com/the-newbie-guide-to-sweden-podcast</u>.

This time we have a Swedish word of the day offerings courtesy of The Local on <u>September 21, 2023</u>. This month we explore the word Swedish word of the day: **stålar**. Simply put, stålar is a Swedish slang word for money.

However, it has its roots in a secret language made up by walking salesmen in western Sweden around the 1800s.

Stålar is one of a number of words in the secret *månsing* language used between socalled *knallar* traders in western Sweden to discuss matters of business they didn't want to reveal to other people present.

This consisted, essentially, of swapping certain Swedish words with other less common words for other languages, or adapting a Swedish word in some way. Understandably, considering they were traders, a lot of words in *månsing* are to do with money – like *stålar*.

Stålar originally comes from the Swedish word stål, meaning steel, which in turn comes from the Old Norse stál. According to the Swedish Academy's dictionary, this is probably due to the *knallar* often paying for things with small items made of steel. Another word from the *månsing* secret language which is still used in Swedish is *fika*, the word for enjoying coffee and cake, which was created by swapping around the syllables in *kaffe*, also known as back slang.

There were also specific words for different amounts of money, including *spänn* for a one krona coin, which is another slang word still used by many Swedes today.

Swedish vocabulary:

Det var inte mycket till stålar i den budgeten. There wasn't a lot of money in that budget.

Man kan tjäna tusen kronor i timmen! Det är stålar det. You can earn a thousand kronor an hour! Now that's money.

White Paper - Action items for September 2024 meeting

- 1. Raise annual dues to \$50 starting in 2025. Monitor's fixed expenses (VASA annual assessment, IOOF Hall rent and website hosting) have increased over the past decade. In addition, there are additional operating expenses such as newsletters and programs/flyers printing, mailing supplies and postage, St. Lucia lunches and costumes, providing for HLM (Honorary Life Member) and senior dues waivers, subsidizing beverage service at meetings, etc. The VASA annual assessment has been \$35.35 per active member for several years but Monitor has not raised its dues, currently \$35.00 per active member, to compensate. In addition, in recent years it has been lodge's practice to transfer monies from the operating fund to the Scholarship fund in memory of deceased members. It is anticipated the IOOF Hall rent will be raised again in the near future.
- 2. Dissolve Building fund move monies to operating fund. The segregated Building fund was established decades ago to enable Monitor lodge to purchase its own building but researching Monitor's records held in Sacramento has turned up no written guidance as to how to manage the fund. In addition, interviews with the very few remaining members who were familiar with the original purpose revealed that there are very few records listing to who donated to the Building fund and no records of how much each of these individuals donated. No documents have been found stating that if the fund were to be disestablished that the monies would be refunded to the donors.

The lodge never accumulated enough funds for the intended purpose of the fund. Conditions over the past couple of decades have made it obvious that the original intent will never be fulfilled so Building fund monies have only been used on rare occasion to fund capital improvement projects, e.g., contribute to IOOF Hall for new kitchen stove.

3. Establish written policy guidance as to how to manage the Operating fund. This would incorporate existing written Monitor business practice policies and would include guidance for creating and maintaining a general budget for planning purposes to minimize surprises regarding future expenditures beyond the monthly rent and website expenses.
